LINK VILLAGES' FELLOWSHIP

There was a very good attendance on Tuesday, February 24th, when Mrs Pat Leslie gave a power point presentation about the Peter Gillard Memorial School in India. Mr Gillard had lived in Highbridge and become interested in a school in a very poor part of India. When he became ill with cancer, he decided to donate funds for the school. Mrs Leslie told us that there are many fund raising events in this area and many people sponsor children. Materials are very limited - the children still use slates and chinks - books which have been donated are left unused on the shelves. The children are educated up to the age of 15 years. Some children board as they are orphans. They have uniforms for school and National Costume on special occasions. At the close of a very informative talk, a collection was taken for the furtherance of the work at the school.

On March 10th. We were pleased to welcome Rev. Pam Pembro who told us the story of Susanna Wesley who was the 25th child in her family. She was a very educated woman in classics. She married Samuel Wesley and bore him 21 children several of whom died in infancy. She taught all her children in their letters which should be learnt in one morning. She spent part of each day in prayers with the children. It was quite a tempestuous marriage. Pam had researched her subject well. We had two visitors who had come to hear about Susanna Wesley.

On March 24th. Yeo Valley Dairies are to give a video talk on the Dairy Farm and the need to diversify into yogurt making.

April 14th. is to be our annual Members' afternoon when there will be a Bring & Buy stall.

Rev. Paul Larcombe is to be our speaker on Tuesday, April 28th.

On May 12th. The New Horizon Singers from Taunton will entertain us with a selection of musical items. At the close there will be a Collection for S.U.R.E. (Somerset Unit for Radiotherapy Equipment) at Musgrove Park Hospital

ARE YOU??

Giving to your Church through Gift Aid

Gift Aid increases the value of donations to UK charities (The Methodist Church) by 28p for every £1.00 given by you, by allowing them to reclaim basic rate tax on your gift.

Making sure you've paid enough tax to use Gift Aid

You can use Gift Aid if the amount of Income Tax and/or Capital Gains Tax you've paid in any tax year (6 April one year to 5 April the next) is at least equal to the amount of basic rate tax the charity is reclaiming on your gift. You don't necessarily have to be working to be paying tax. Apart from tax on income from a job or self-employment, the tax you've paid could include:

- tax deducted at source from savings interest
- tax on State Pension and/or other pensions
- tax on investment or rental income

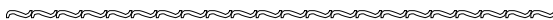
How to check if you've paid enough tax

To work out if you've paid enough tax to cover your donations, divide the donation value by four. For example, if you give £100 in a particular tax year you will need to have paid £25 tax over that period. ($£100/4 = £25$). (Note that this calculation is based on the basic rate tax of 20 per cent)

If you don't think you've paid enough tax this year, you may be able to backdate your donation. Or you can limit the amount that is Gift Aided if you pay only a small amount of tax.

But only UK tax counts, so if you only pay tax outside the UK you won't be able to use Gift Aid.

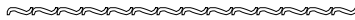


THE MANY PARTS FORM ONE BODY!

CORINTHIANS 12:12 NIV

There is a wonderful story about Jimmy Durante, one of the truly great entertainers. He was asked to do a show for World War II veterans. He told them he was very busy but if they wouldn't mind him doing one short monologue and leaving immediately for his next appointment he'd go, they agreed. But when Jimmy got on stage he went through the short monologue then stayed and stayed. Soon he'd been on stage 15, 20, then 30 minutes. Finally he took a last bow and left. What happened?' Jimmy answered, - you can see for yourself if you look on the front row'. In the front row were two veterans, each of whom had lost an arm in the war. One his right arm and the other had lost his left. Together they were able to clap and that's exactly what they were doing, loudly and cheerfully.

That's a picture of what happens in church: -but the many parts make up only one body when they are all put together. So it is with the 'body' of Christ. But to enjoy its benefits you have to go, and when you get there you must reach out to others so that you can know and be known, strengthening and being strengthened. Pew-sitting, back of the head fellowship won't do. Someone sitting next to you has 20/20 vision where you have blind spots. You need their counsel, correction and comfort; and they need yours. When that happens, the church is working like it's supposed to

2 CORINTHIANS 9:6 Niv

Have you ever gone to a restaurant with somebody whose meal cost £8, and watched them struggle over the tip? They have £2 in change, and they know that leaving just £1 might be thought of as stingy. Yet do they leave £2? Not on your life! That would be too much. Instead they'll waste ten minutes getting change for that second pound so they can leave £1.50 tip and save themselves 50 pence, rather than 'sow generously' and leave a little extra. What would have happened if they'd left the full £2? They would have made the waiter or waitress's day. Fifty pence may not seem like much, but the message that goes along with it can mean the world to someone. It says, 'Thanks, you did a good job, I appreciate you. You're valuable.' Maybe this message gets lost; your server just sweeps up the tip without counting; but you, the one who 'sows generously' will still 'reap generously'. What an opportunity. We can increase

the happiness of others, and bless ourselves, with just pocket change. This is just one tiny example of the many ways in which the small things we do have surprisingly big repercussions. Small acts of kindness set the tone for our day. Going the extra mile whether it's a slightly larger tip. An unexpected compliment or gift, or just holding a door open for someone - costs very little and gets you a lot. And here's one more thought: we can have mountain-moving faith, understand and explain all the deep doctrines of the Bible and get top marks for personal holiness, yet God's Word says that without love 'I am nothing' (1 Corinthians 13:2).
