Minister's Letter

“Freedom

I fall to grace and into your arms

Cause we got freedom

You've stolen the dark

And turned it to stars”

These words have been going round in my mind recently. They are from a song by Paloma Faith called “Freedom” which you may have heard me play in church.

The first thing that struck me is the link the words seem to make between grace and freedom:

Grace is supremely important to us as Christians because it is by God's grace alone that we are able to receive salvation through Jesus. In fact it is only by God's grace that we are able to do any good at all. We live wholly by grace: God's prevenient grace goes before – preparing the way for us to receive and respond to God's offer of justifying grace. Accepting that offer is what we refer to as “conversion” or being “born again”, it is the new life that we receive in Christ Jesus and which brings us freedom from guilt and sin.

Of course we need to remember that the point at which we accept it is not the end of God's work of grace – God's sustaining grace can save us from “falling from grace” back into sin – making the wrong choices for our lives. To do this we are to make use of “the means of grace” – works of piety (prayer, worship, Holy Communion, reading the Bible) and works of mercy (good deeds). John Wesley taught that *both* are required to ensure that we work towards Christian perfection.

So God's grace leads us to freedom in Jesus Christ, giving us much to be thankful for.

The second thing that strikes me about this verse is the description of the dark being “stolen” and turned to stars. In other words the light (of the stars) overcomes the darkness. This reminds me of the beginning of John's gospel where Jesus is described as the “light of the world”: “the light shines in the darkness and the darkness has never overcome it”.

This is a time of year of many contrasts of light and dark. Last week in Burnham we had our fireworks lighting up the sky above the sea front giving a magnificent display set to music. The following evening we had the bright lights of the carnival. As the floats made their way slowly through the town you could see the night sky lit up brightly long before you saw the procession itself.

During Advent and Christmas our churches will be filled with candles; Advent rings and fairy lights bringing a joyful glow to the dark chill of winter days.

As we enter the Advent season – that time of preparation for the season of Christmas, and also of looking towards the time when Jesus’ kingdom will be fulfilled, light is a powerful symbol of that grace and freedom that we have received and it is because we have received such grace that we are called to share it with others.

So as we celebrate God’s greatest gift of love this Christmas time – let us be generous in sharing that love with everyone.

At a time when many of our churches are struggling to keep going with fewer people, we need to build our confidence in talking about our faith with others.

EN ROUTE TO CAMEROON

My name is Daniel and me, my wife Grace and our son Kwame, are going to be Mission Partners working at a theological college in Cameroon. I haven't always been a Christian. I was brought up in the Church but I left altogether at the age of eleven. I got into trouble at school and almost failed my GCSEs. Although I managed to enter Sixth Form College, I still struggled a great deal. Despite the fact that I was now working very hard, the Head of the College said I was incapable of going to University. I was a dunce at school. I was the first to put up my hand and say, "I don't understand." I never understood what was going on. It is a miracle of God that I passed my school exams.

Shortly before my A Levels I encountered a retired Methodist Minister – my father in God - who took me "under his wing" He himself had fought very hard to fulfil the academic requirements necessary for the ordained ministry. It was his practical tips, encouragement and kindness, which led me, not only to pass my exams, but also to offer my whole life to Christ. The care that I received at the start of the journey was, for me, an

illustration of the love which God the Father has for us all. My Prayer is that the Holy Spirit will enable my wife and I to be witnesses of this Love to the students we will work with in Cameroon. Please pray for us, that we will be given wisdom, patience and prayerful hearts.

THE CHRISTMAS STORY

Many Christians are horrified by the thought of the Christmas stories as myths.

For a large number, the Bible is the word of God, to be taken wholly and in every part, without deviation.

For others, and perhaps for most, the stories are there, they don't think about them to that degree. They may put their own interpretation on parts about which they feel uncomfortable, but in general are happy to just go with the flow.

But for many Christians, the stories just don't make sense and they cannot accept them at face value however you interpret them and however much people might say that in the power of God anything is possible. They are myths, they say, and a myth is a story created to reveal a deeper truth.

Yet even when we accept the gospel stories at face value, we have still added our own layers of myth to what is written before us. It is we and not the Bible that say there were three wise men, for example; we have even given them names in order to give greater impact to the story.

It is we and not the Bible who create a picture of a worn out couple arriving at an inn after a long journey and being turned away. Even more, it is tradition and not the original Greek version of scripture which has called it an inn in the first place. The Greek word is the same as that used

at the other end of Jesus' life and which we translate as the upper room. The translation that could link both instances is 'guest room'.

Twenty years ago when Judy and I went trekking in Southern Morocco in a party of 20 people, we were housed for the first night in two guest rooms in a remote village. In other words, 10 of us bunked down in our sleeping bags in each room. That must have been what it was like 2000 years ago in Palestine (though not the sleeping bags bit). Not a private place to bring a baby into the world. Far better in a clean stable, such as we saw later in our trek. And empty, for it is we and not the Bible who have populated it with animals (the earliest reference we have for the animals is dated to the 8th or 9th century).

And who said that Mary and Joseph had come down from Nazareth anyway? Only Luke, for Matthew has them setting out to return home to Bethlehem after their sojourn in Egypt and only going to Nazareth after they had been warned in a dream. And while we are in Matthew's account, it is only our tradition that says the wise men came at the time of the birth; it could have been months later. Mark and John do not have stories about the birth and that great letter writer, Paul, only mentions Jesus' earthly origins in a side reference in his letter to the Galatians ('Jesus Christ, born of a woman').

And the year and season? Well almost certainly not the year 0. Herod was dead by then. And as to the time of the year, it is we and not the Bible who put the birth into the middle of winter. It was into the Second Century before the idea of remembering the birth of Jesus entered the Church's calendar and not until late into the 3rd Century before December 25th was chosen. In the interval dates between November and April were the most favoured. By April, of course, the animals, particularly sheep, would have left their winter quarters for the hillsides; time to clean out the barns and put fresh straw down!

Those Christians who treat the stories as myths find even more reasons to doubt the accounts in Matthew and Luke whether it be the Wise Men and their fixation on a star that pinpointed the place of birth, or whether it be questioning the anomalies in Luke's version.

But whether they are myths or not, what unites Christians, whichever way they understand the Christmas narrative, is the belief that in Jesus, God became human. That is at the root of our faith. God so loved.... That is

what will bring us together at this season, however differently and imperfectly we see the stories and sing with gusto the words of the carols. For our faith tells us God is Love and God is Spirit.

In these days the world seems to be tearing itself apart in uncertainty and fear, whether through one economic crisis or another, or in the sheer horror of war and combat. Christmas gives us the chance to sense a different vision. We proclaim that, whatever threatens us, in this Love there can still be hope.
