Minister's Letter

Dear Friends...

Well here we are starting the season of Advent, for me personally it still feels like August! I am at the stage of thinking that I will be ready for Christmas by March!

But our Church calendar tells me differently!

Advent a time of waiting, a time of hope, a time of preparation, a time to dream, a time of expectation...

Peace on earth has already come 2,000 years ago. But it has not fully come yet. It has only come as a glimpse of what *can* be.

The fulfilment of the promises has become new promises and expectation. And so we dream Isaiah's dream again. We dream the dream of a divided people that God will bring wholeness, even as we hammer on our swords and spears trying to make plough-shares.

When? How long? When will that day come? We do not know. But we hope and wait expectantly. We live today in the reality of what he has already showed us, and what he has promised. And we cry out for his coming. And we know that as He *has* come, so He *will* come.

For if you cannot recognize in another's face the face of your brother, the darkness has not yet begun to lift, and the light has not yet come.**"

As you prepare to celebrate Jesus' birth, may you be challenged by the season of Advent, and may you and those you love have a peaceful Christmas.

THE INVITATION PROCESS FOR OUR NEW MINISTERS – PART 4

It is pleasing to be able to say that the Rev Stephen Bennett has accepted the Circuit's invitation to become Superintendent of the Circuit at the start of the next Connexional Year in September 2015. The invitation is for five years in the first instance. We look forward to welcoming Steve (he is happy to be called that) and his wife, Liz, to the Circuit and we will keep him in touch with developments here in the interim. They will live in the Burnham manse and Steve will have pastoral charge of the five churches that form the Link group. Because of the Connexional nature of the Methodist Church we have to add those few but significant words, 'subject to the approval of Conference'. Conference meets at the end of June and beginning of July so one of the very last actions on 3rd July will be for the President to Call the Stations, by asking each Chair in turn to agree that the printed list of Ministers is as expected. Conference then stands to approve the list. Only then can ministers (and this includes all ministers however long they have been in their appointment) breathe a sigh of relief and know they are safe for another year.

As for the Weston-super-Mare appointments we are very confident that we shall be 'matched' with a deacon (the Warden of the Diaconal Order has us high on her list). We are hopeful that we shall get a presbyter but the list of those available is now much reduced. Rev Ward Jones our District Chairman will tell Norman Lester late on 2nd December whether we have been successful in the next round and then the visits and conversations will begin again. So to stewards, especially in Weston please be available to show the minister round your church. This could be anytime over the two weeks following 2nd December, though Saturday is the most likely day. The Invitations Committee will meet within a day or so of the visit and any developments will be reported on the Circuit Website:

Following the appointment of Mr Bennett, the Circuit will soon advertise for a Circuit Administrator to relieve the Superintendent Minister of some of the routine office tasks.

The Invitations process developed hand in hand with our Vision for the future. There was a good response to the half day consultation at St Andrews, Bournville, where members of the Regional Discipleship and Ministries Learning and Development Team gave us valuable advice and encouragement. Rev Stephen Marr has posted a report of the event on the circuit website (follow the link from Notice board to Circuit Celebration/Consultation) so please take time to read what he has to say and talk about it within your church.

Prayer letter from Daniel and Grace Pratt-Chapman and their little son Kwame-

Our Circuit Link in Cameroon, teaching in a theological college.

Do you have remembrance Sunday in Cameroon?" I asked the parish pastor. "NO" he answered abruptly. I was of course quite taken a-back by his reaction. As I came home, after the service, I desperately tried to figure out what lay behind this response.

The answer didn't really dawn on me until a week later (but then I have always been a bit slow). At the end of the First World War Germany was forced to give up its colonial territories. Cameroon, which had been under German control up until 1918, was one of the spoils of the war and was thus split between the English and the French. This division had lasting consequences.

Cameroon was made into two separate territories (like East and West Germany after WW2 but) with different languages: English and French. For four decades half the nation was given a diet of English language and culture while the other, eastern, part consumed French cultural cuisine. In the sixties things were sticky-taped back together when Cameroon got its independence and colonialism 'ended.' However, as I'm sure you can imagine, after this 'reunion,' things were never quite the same.

Forty years is a long time. The eastern, French, part is now totally different from the English side where we live. Of course, the terrible irony here is that, neither culture (English nor French) is indigenous to this land. Long before Europeans arrived, this land was home to hundreds of languages and cultures.

Sadly the colonial enterprise not only took away peoples' land, it stole their culture.

The invading European nations not only pillaged Africa for its resources, they tried to recreate the people in their own image. As a result locals have been force-fed unsavoury European languages, education and culture. The resulting ideological indigestion has proved disastrous. This is no more apparent than when travelling from Anglophone (west) to Francophone (east) Cameroon. These two groups view the other in terms that cannot be repeated here- all I can do is ask you to imagine you are watching Henry V (or listening to an Englishman complain about French apples in T*sc*s). Were there twenty miles of ocean between these peoples this tension could perhaps be explained. Yet both groups, the Anglophone and the Francophone, are Cameroonians - some share the same indigenous language (but talk about each other as though they are from different planets).

If ever you find it difficult to fathom the havoc that our meddling has wreaked upon the world, come to Cameroon. The worst, most tragic, part of this story is that when Cameroonians get to France, to pursue the "French Dream" that was imparted to them, they are shocked to discover that, despite the profound effort they have made to assimilate a European culture, they are not wanted- and are even being blamed for Europe's debt crisis (which surely has far more to do with credit cards than asylum seekers?) We have such short memories. We go to every corner of the earth-forcing people to copy our culture. When they listen to us and come to see our great 'civilization,' our wonderful systems of education, we reject them (or charge them three times as much). May God help us to truly remember the lasting effects of imperialism.

I think I understand now why people here do not wear poppies. Still, it would be very wrong to forget those, both living and dead, who have given everything in service for their country. Even more should we remember soldiers from Africa (and elsewhere) who, despite offering their lives on behalf of European nations, are denied visas to enter them. We must not lose sight of the great debt that we owe to these people and their descendants. People, who fought, for the freedom of those who had colonized them, should surely be remembered.

I'm not saying war is always wrong-there are far too many snakes in my garden for me to become a pacifist. Hitler's obsession with racial purity had to be stopped. If not, he would have continued to use the tools of an industrialised nation to systematically destroy the people he deemed to be un-German. Today it is unthinkable that developments in modern technology could be used to commit such unimaginable horror. Nevertheless just suppose that, en-mass,

Europeans voted for parties obsessed with national identity. Imagine if drones, surveillance cameras and internet chat rooms were used to root out those society deemed foreign. Surely the whole notion is preposterous?

Too often we forget that Hitler was actually elected. That people voted for him to have absolute power. The present global economic crisis, and the emergence of Xenophobic political parties throughout Europe, is truly terrifying. If we forget how what happened we will be in real trouble. May God help us to remember; to remember both the causes, and the lasting effects of war.

Remember me also. Fast and pray if you can. For on the twelfth day of the twelfth month at the eleventh hour (10.30 actually) I will really be in the lion's den. In short, please pray that my PhD exam goes well. It is by no means given that, if you get to this stage, you pass straight away-they can even ask you to start again if they don't agree with what you have written. It is not uncommon - if they like what you write -for them to ask you to make corrections that require another year to amend. Basically, I really need your prayers on 12th Dec.

We recently had a Local Arrangement here at Brent Knoll and a contribution to the service from Carol Fisher reminded us of the challenges ministers face on a daily basis. Entitled "He...gave some to be...pastors... (Ephesians 4.11)" it reads as follows:

"Pastors have a tough job. They get more kicks than kisses. If a pastor is young he lacks experience; if he's grey-haired he's too old. If he has five kids he has too many; if he has none he's setting a bad example. If his wife sings in the choir she's being forward, if not, she's not dedicated enough. If he preaches from notes he's dry; if he preaches extemporaneous he's too shallow. If he spends too much time in his study he's neglecting his people; if he makes home visits he's not a good time manager. If he's attentive to the poor he's after public approval; if he attends to the wealthy he's ingratiating. If he suggests improvements he's a dictator; if he doesn't he has no vision. If he uses too many illustrations he neglects the Bible; if he doesn't use enough stories, he's unclear. If he speaks against wrong he's legalistic, if he doesn't he's a compromiser. If he preaches for an hour he's windy; less than that, he has nothing to say. If he preaches the truth he's offensive; if he doesn't he's wishy-washy. If he fails to please everybody he's hurting the church; if he tries to please everybody he has no convictions. If he preaches tithing he's a money-grabber; if not, he's failing to develop his people. If he receives a large salary he's mercenary; if he doesn't it proves he's not worth much. If he preaches on a regular basis, people get tired of hearing the same person; if he invites guest preachers he's shirking his responsibility. Wow! And you thought your pastor had an easy life! How'd you like to change places? Bottom line: love your pastor."

As we approach Advent, we are looking forward to seeing our Link Church friends at our Christmas Coffee Morning on Saturday 29th November at 10.30am. A warm welcome, coffee and mince pies are guaranteed.

We will be holding our All Age Worship Christmas service on Sunday 21st December and are hoping to see as many young people from the Village as possible as we go through the Christmas story together.

Our Carol service will be held at our morning service on Sunday 30th December. This follows the tradition of Advent being a time of preparation and reflection as we look forward to the birth of Christ and then the start of 12 days of celebration until Epiphany.
