We might prefer to think of ourselves retired from roles we have held for so long....but we too are called and deployed by God into this time and place. We are called to work out what these changing circumstances mean to the way in which we 'preach the good news' through word and action. We are adopted as God's children, to live as church in this generation. Although 2023 will be a testing year for us all, rejoice and be glad, for we have been equipped and prepared by God to face even these challenges.

It made an excellent combination and I rather think I am going to have to try marmalade with my bacon next time!

A happy evening it was. Sausage, mash, fried onions, baked beans, what could be better on a Saturday evening in great company; and then fresh fruit and various chocolate to finish off. After all that, Ann led us through our Beetle Drive which Stanley won quite convincingly. Even better. we were greatly pleased to welcome a couple of Ukrainian refugees to our feast. They were brought by Jeremy one of our Anglican friends. Our thanks to all those who contributed to the success of the evening, in particular to Judy who took charge of most of the catering, and to Anne and Rose who organised the Beetle drive. We were a bit fewer in numbers this year with, for example, Celia and Jimmy both under the weather with Covid; and Kathy and Roger both suffering from injuries received from a bus crash in Weston; and others at family birthday events, and so on. But, even so, it was a very happy occasion with plenty of chatter and mixing around.

We wish all those who are suffering from Covid and other illnesses, speedy recoveries. And our special concerns for the walking wounded who were on that bus into which a van crashed this week, Roger with a badly sprained ankle and Kathy with one leg broken and the other badly gashed along the length of a bone. Our thoughts are with them and wishes for a speedy return to full health.

It seems a while since Christmas and we hope that you all enjoyed your own festivities. Over the last few years we have stopped sending Christmas cards to each other in the church and instead have made a collective donation to All we Can; this year we raised a record £100 which meant we could nominate our offering to provide plumbing and

toilet facilities for a needy community in Africa. Then the collection during the carol service raised an incredible £215 which was sent to Action for Children; an amazing result, thank you to everyone. And very humbling that people should be so generous.

The wider Christmas observations went well too, the joint December service with our Anglican friends with lunch afterwards, the Coffee and Carols event a week before the big day and our Carol Service on Christmas Eve to which just over forty people came.

Judy and I tried to get to Carol Services in some of our other churches but that last week before Christmas was disrupted for us by the death of Judy's brother's partner up in Loughborough. That misfortune involved us in needing to be present elsewhere and our other intentions to be put aside.

Our services are increasingly benefitting from the Video equipment that is now installed. The singing at the carol service was especially notable and the graphics that John provided were very much appreciated. The service ended, as you might expect, with tea and cake and chat in the schoolroom.

And so we come to February, the month of our Church Council. What news and what challenges await us on this occasion, I wonder.

Elsewhere, twelve months ago was the time of Russia's incursion into Ukraine; how much sorrow that has given all, and not just to the Ukrainians themselves.

And our friends at St Bridget's have important discussions this month on the future of their church; our thoughts and prayers go with them all.

And finally, February is also the start of Lent; we walk with Jesus along his journey to the Cross in love and expectation.

We hope that you will all find good vibes as we journey through this month.

Rev Richard Sharples says

"To my knowledge, this is the first time works from the Methodist Modern Art Collection have been exhibited alongside art/artefacts from other faith traditions. The title of the exhibition 'Articles of Faith' suggests those beliefs which people of faith hold close to our hearts. We do believe different things, yet we share so much, and when we get under the skin to the inner experience of practicing our faith, then we draw closer together. Hence the strapline, 'Where our paths meet'. We hope that those who are curious about religion, or who have no faith, will feel equally included."

#### The Waffle Hub

This is just a quick update to let you know how The Waffle Hub is progressing.......

As many of you know already the Community Café is up and running in the Methodist Church in Burnham. Here we provide food (waffles with a choice of various savoury and sweet toppings) and drinks (hot and cold) at affordable prices for all. For those who cannot afford anything we run a pay-it-forward scheme where tips and donations are set aside to pay for their food and drinks. We have many customers who are very generous, so we never have to worry about if there is money to cover these costs. Over the past few months we have supported several homeless and less well off people with this scheme.

We are very grateful to the Burnham Church who have let us use their building free for our first four months of trading and also applied for a 'warm spaces' grant on our behalf. This has helped us considerably with the costs involved in heating the building and giving us time to get ourselves known in the community.

As a Warm Space we have recently been able to take on hosting the church's 'Knit and Natter' group (recently set up on Wednesday afternoons from 2-4pm on 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Wednesdays of each month) and 'Burnham Carers Social Group' who meet on the 4<sup>th</sup> Tuesday of every month from 10-11.30am.

The Digital Champions part of The Waffle Hub is getting off to a slow start. We have had a few people who have come in wanting IT help and advice and we have been able to spend time with them, teaching and pointing them in the right direction. We aim to spend a bit more time advertising this service and getting it up and running properly in the near future.

Another new venture for The Waffle Hub is the Cookery Lessons we will be running from the middle of February. We have just purchased the equipment needed to teach 4 people at a time to cook simple, affordable, well-balanced meals for themselves/their families. Each lesson (a series of 6 lessons) will be free to all and everyone will take home the food they have cooked to feed their family for that evening. So far we have had a good response from those interested.

The success of The Waffle Hub and all its different projects is very much down to the very willing and capable volunteers we have and have had. All of them have given so much time, energy and experience to this venture and we are so grateful to them. We have been privileged to work with members from different churches in Burnham, volunteers from Somewhere House, and volunteers from our community all giving of their best to us. We thank, also, those who

have supported us with their custom, we couldn't have done it without you!


