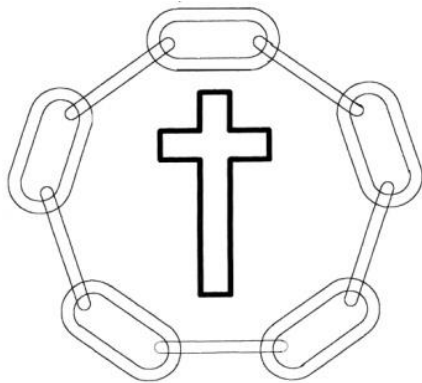

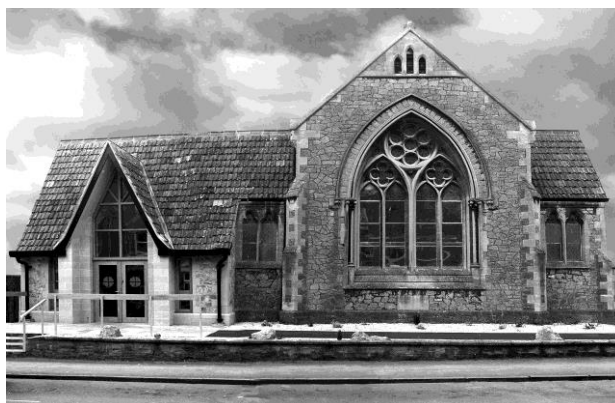

The holiday season is firmly upon us and here at Brent Knoll we're looking forward to our annual August coffee mornings which will take place each Saturday of the month at 10.30am. We're all enjoy sharing refreshments, catching up and exchanging news with our Circuit and village friends. The first Saturday coffee morning (4 June) coincides with churches across the country marking the start of 100 days of prayer for peace and reconciliation in the lead up to the commemoration of the end of the Great War 100 years ago this year. To mark this, as well as the school room being open for coffee, our church will also be open for those wanting to mark the beginning of these 100 days of prayer. As in previous years, any monies raised from these coffee mornings will be donated to designated charities. This year these charities are the Weston Hospice, the MS Centre, the RNLI and All We Can. I will let you have details of monies raised for these charities in the September issue of The Link.

As this year flies by, I'm finding it hard to believe that I'm actually writing the "July/August" article for our church - but looking further ahead, we're also thinking ahead to September. One of the things to come out of the Circuit Review was the recognition that rural and town centre churches have very different opportunities for mission. Here in Brent Knoll, we're very conscious of parents and carers having busy Sundays as children play sports and take part in other activities over much of the weekend. So we have decided to open our church for a time of prayer on the first Monday of each month. It will afford an opportunity for parents and carers who begin their week with a frantic school run to enjoy a short period of calm at the beginning of their busy week. Since we've installed our beautiful prayer tree, we thought we could open this space of prayer to the village. Tea lights will also be available for those who would like to light one - either in prayer or in remembrance of a loved one. But don't think this is just for parents and carers! This time is for all who would like to spend a while in the peace and serenity of the church. There will also be someone in the school room if people would like to have someone to talk to or have a coffee during this time. The church will be open on Monday 3 September between 9am - 10.30am.

And of course, September is the month of Harvest and we will be holding our Harvest Festival on 9 September. This is one of our favourite times of the year as our chapel really does look its best decked out in seasonal fare as we look forward to this special service which will be followed by a home prepared shared lunch. We all love celebrating this special time in our country church calendar.

So until September, all that is left to say from all of us at Brent Knoll is that we wish you a safe, peaceful and restful Summer whether you are travelling far or enjoying time at home in our beautiful part of the world.

Enjoying these very warm summer evenings when it's too warm to work in the garden (at least that is what I say to Helen) . I find time to reflect over the many years I have been a member of the Methodist Church.

When I lived in Birmingham our Local Methodist Church had major building problems and the decision had to be made knock the building down and start again or try to raise the funds to repair it. The decision was made knock it down and rebuild. We had a congregation of approx 200/250 folk per week as well as healthy lettings. We had many problems on the way including the builder going bankrupt but still the vision of what we were trying to achieve burned brightly. For four years we met in the local community centre and when the Church was finished we had walk of witness from the community centre to the new Church for our very first service in the new Church. The first hymn was 'Be still for the presence of the Lord is moving in this place'. There were a few of us that had put many hours into finishing the building and that hymn reduced us to tears.

Now twenty five years later I feel the same about the plans for where the circuit is going I have been privileged on your behalf to attend the bi-monthly meetings following on from the Meeting we had in April when over seventy folk meet to discuss the circuit and where did we think it will be in five years and ten years we listen to the plans for new housing both in Weston and Highbridge with excitement. Yes it has the same overwhelming feeling that I had all those years ago. The Lord is moving in this area. We at Burnham have a meeting planned for July with the Stewards asking the congregation to come listen, and join in to the planning meeting for mission in our area the date is Sunday July 22nd after morning service please make a date in your diary you can be sure of a warm welcome. We have a really great opportunity to spread the good news let us grab the chance with both hands

Gwennap Pit. Have you ever been there? It's a natural amphitheatre about 100 yards across formed from a collapsed mine. It has a special atmosphere. Judy and I first visited it on our honeymoon over 50 years ago. We've visited it a couple of times since but without there being people present. But John Wesley used to claim it as a favourite preaching place. He could get over a thousand people listening to him; and an elderly friend of ours can also remember such numbers in her lifetime. We spent a few days in Cornwall at the end of May and were delighted that on Pentecost Sunday afternoon, a service was being held there. I counted a couple of hundred people present and though I can't say that the style of worship was one I would normally find satisfaction in, the whole atmosphere was such that any differences of approach were more than compensated by the overall spirituality of the service. A couple from a local Christian motorbike group added colour to the occasion with some splendid waving of huge flags. If you ever get the chance to visit the place, it is well worth it; a few miles west of A30 south east of Redruth.

On our return it was hands to the pump for the Coffee morning in aid of Weston Hospicecare. As we sat in the church wondering where our anticipated deluge of visitors had got to, Rosemary walked in 'What are you doing inside? It's a lovely day we should be out there in the front of the chapel. 'So, we upped sticks and did what Rosemary said; and indeed, things did pick up. In the end we raised £105 to send to the good cause. So, thank you to all those who contributed and to those who came and supported us.

We have done quite well for visitors so far with 25 on Spring Bank Holiday and 20 on a couple of occasions since. Groups also use our chapel for fun and fellowship, Yatton on 16th June, and Locking Castle are due on 23rd

Not so welcome however was the inebriated visitor who ventured round the back of the chapel one afternoon and threw a breeze block through the window of the kitchen. A nasty bit of work to clear up and thanks to Anne and Rose for their efforts.

We have been well absorbed during the month in getting to grips with Jonah. It is surprising how many different perspectives have been given during the services. Our thanks to preachers for the efforts they have put into this series.

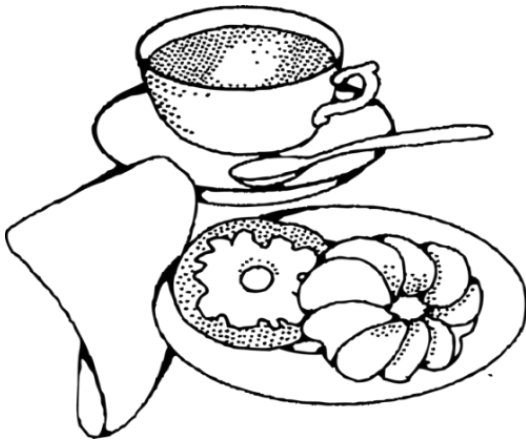
