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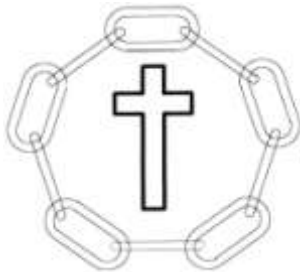

Minister's Letter

As I write there are some clear signs that Summer, if not quite here yet, it's just around the corner. Firstly, I'm sitting outside in the garden on the first really sunny and warm day we've had this year, with the forecast expecting even warmer temperatures for the weekend.

Secondly the garden is rampant – the grass growing inches every day, the weed beds turning green faster than Julie can weed and various young birds hopping around the garden with beaks wide open hoping to be fed by their parents.

Finally – it's time to dig the camping equipment out from the garage where it has sat in the trailer since we arrived here last August currently hidden under a pile of cardboard! This is because next weekend (spring bank holiday weekend) we will be off to Firm Foundations*.

Firm Foundations is a Christian festival run by the Boys' and Girls' Brigades at Feldon Lodge the BB Head Quarters in Hemel Hempstead which, according to the poster, will be: "Featuring an action packed programme of worship, speakers, workshops, bands, activities, space to be you and lots of laughs". Julie and I have been attending FF for a few years now usually with a group of young people, although as we have none to take this year we will be helping our friends from the Bristol Circuit.

For me it is a time to recharge the spiritual batteries. It is inspirational to see young people enjoying themselves in a Christian environment, learning more about the faith and engaging in worship. There are usually excellent speakers and bands and I return (even after some of the rather wet weekends we've sometimes had there) with renewed energy and vision for ministry.

I think the Apostles must have felt rather like that after receiving the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. There they were hanging around in an upstairs room after Jesus had finally left them having ascended into heaven (Acts 1: 12 – 2:21). Their moral must have been quite low at that point and they lacked the courage and initiative they needed to go out and spread the message of Jesus. But as he had promised (John 14:16), the Holy Spirit came amongst them in the sound of the wind, flames like

tongues of fire coming to rest on each one of them. Peter was inspired to preach and they went out praising God to spread his word (Acts 2).

Jesus promised that anything asked in his name would be done. The Holy Spirit is active and working today in our churches and communities just as he was then. What will we ask him for today?

I would ask you to pray for the difficult situations facing many of our churches today, especially as we adjust to the recent loss of some of our faithful and dearly loved brothers and sisters. Also please pray for new initiatives such as the new “Messy Church” starting at Burnham on the 6th June, and that the Holy Spirit will bless and inspire us as we seek to be the church in a new way.

On May 11th. Rev. Stanley Pipet visited the fellowship with a selection of fuchsias with which he illustrated his talk. He spoke of how his interest had been sparked by two ladies at one of his London Churches. Early in the last century, their brother, Bert Brown, had felt the call to be a missionary, but with no education and no money, he was very firmly turned down. Undaunted by this, Bert was determined to pursue his calling, so he harnessed the family's one resource – land at the back of their home - to grow and develop fuchsias. First he spent time in Holland to learn all he could to achieve this aim, and success led to him showing at Chelsea Flower Show. Having now acquired the required money and education, he made the running of the nursery over to his sisters, and then began his preparations. He trained at theological college, then realised that medical training would be a great asset too, so he qualified as a doctor. The rest of his life until retirement was spent as a missionary in Papua New Guinea. The fuchsias Stanley brought with him were named after family members, including Bert Brown apart from one which was developed as a tribute to his work as a missionary which is called "Mission Bells"

Young Methodists geared to get **Generous**

- New website for young people run by young people

A website for young people run by young people has been launched by the Methodist Children and Youth Team.

Generous is a safe, online space designed to enable young people to discuss and act upon decisions made at Youth Assembly – an interactive body designed to maximise the impact of young people’s influence on the Methodist Church in Britain. Young people can sign up to the site and pledge their commitment to different goals, such as confronting racist behaviour or challenging Churches on the opportunities available to them.

The website offers young people the opportunity to work together on maximising the impact they can have on the wider Church. Every young person who signs up and joins the debate becomes an activist and voice for social change.

Pete Brady, Methodist Youth President, said: “**Generous** is a great way for young people to keep in touch with others they met at Youth Assembly. It offers the chance for young people to share things that affect them on a daily basis in their lives and churches. This is an opportunity for young people to be part of the decision-making process emerging from the Youth Assembly that will then play its part in re-shaping the Methodist Church. I am very excited about how this will increase youth participation across the Districts. **Generous** is easy and free to join. The more young people leaving comments, signing up to actions, meeting in the chat rooms; the more dynamic the forum will be.”

Pete Brady has piloted the website with a group of ‘Generous DJs’ – young people from Youth Assembly who have tested the site’s usability. The DJs will also serve as promoters for **Generous** – getting their peers enthused about the site and working on developing its content, direction and moderation.

The World Missionary Conference’1910

It is just one hundred years since one of the most significant international Christian gatherings for many generations was held in Edinburgh in June 1910. It was ‘The World Missionary Conference’ repercussion of which are still with us today. To mark the centenary of that Conference, many representatives of churches across the world will be coming together in another conference in Edinburgh this month with the theme: ‘Witnessing to Christ in Humility and Hope’.

Nowadays we expect the churches to at least co-operate with each other. It was not always so. Even those of us whose memories go back for seventy years or so will remember a coldness between different denominations. For example Anglicans were told they ought not to take part in free church services. The free churches were very suspicious of the Anglicans and even more of the Roman Catholics.

For very many years before 1910 many Christians had been disturbed by these rivalries. In particular those involved in missionary work felt that the divisions between the churches were a real hindrance in carrying out God’s call to evangelise the world. There had previously been a number of conferences of Protestant Missionary bodies, but the really significant one was this one, held just one hundred years ago. It brought 1215 delegates together, most of them from the non western world, and from what we would call ‘Evangelical’ churches. This conference was to provide in time the impetus to launch the ecumenical movement. In that it was helped by the fact that, for the first time an Anglican Missionary Society: the S.P.G. agreed to attend. It was to lead in the nineteen twenties and thirties to the ‘Faith and Order’ and ‘Life and Work’ movements,

which in their turn were to lead in 1948, after the war, to the establishment of the 'World Council of Churches' The first Assembly of the World Council of Churches sent the following message to the churches:

'Here at Amsterdam we have committed ourselves to him, and have covenanted with one another in constituting the World Council of Churches. We intend to stay together.'

This gathering gave a stimulus to the churches in India, and Zambia to move towards unity, and also for the Presbyterian and Congregational churches in this country to combine as the United Reformed Church. It also meant that local churches began to talk to each other in the new local councils of churches which later became, 'Churches Together'.

This has been a truly significant period in Christian history and led to the joint actions that now we take for granted. We should be grateful for all the progress so far. There is however a long way to go before the churches fulfil Christ's great high priestly prayer that 'they should all be one'.

Harry's Column

Taking your place in the plan of God

'... "I AM...THE GOD OF ABRAHAM... ISAAC, AND...JACOB" ...'
EXODUS 3:6 NKJV

Today we're conditioned to think in terms of instant gratification. We're the generation of lunchtime face lifts and text messaging; we hate to wait for anything. Think about the last time you had to wait for something to arrive by 'snail mail/or stand in line at the checkout counter. Now, here's where we get it wrong: we expect whatever God initiates through us to be completed; while we are still around to see the end result We don't like it when He decides to continue the work through another person, or worse, another generation! But that's how God works. When God reveals something to you it's usually within the framework of what's already taken place before you came on the scene. He told Moses. 'I am the God of your father.. .of Abraham.. .Isaac, and..Jacob.' God had made certain promises to Moses' forefathers hundreds of year's earlier, and now it was Moses' time to take his place in the plan of God. Accepting that you're a small link in a big chain can be humbling, but once Moses understood it he was able to connect with and focus on something bigger than himself. It's not important who does the planting, or who does the watering. What's important is that God makes the seed grow. The one who plants and the one who waters work together with the same purpose. And both will be rewarded for their own hard work' (1 Corinthians 3:7-8 NLT). It's amazing what you can accomplish when you're not concerned about who carries the torch over the finish line.

Historian Cassius Dio recorded a revealing event from the life of Hadrian, the Roman Emperor from AD 117-138: "Once, when a woman made a request of [Hadrian] as he passed by on a journey, he at first said to her, 'I haven't time,' but afterwards, when she cried out, 'Cease, then, being emperor,' he turned about and granted her a hearing."

How often we say or hear, "Not now, I'm busy" or "I'm sorry, but I just don't have time." Yet our heavenly Father, the Master and Creator of everything, always has time for us.- The psalmist wrote: "The eyes of the LORD are on the righteous, and His ears are open to their cry. . . The righteous cry out, and the LORD hears, and delivers them out of all their troubles" (Ps. 34:15-17).

God is not like the emperor or a busy executive who tries to avoid interruption. Instead, the Father's joy is to listen and respond to His children. "The LORD is near to those who have a broken heart, and saves such as have a contrite spirit" (v. 18).

Hadrian's afterthought was, "I must take time for my subjects." God's first thought is, "I always have time for those who come to Me." Whenever we need to talk, the Lord is ready to listen.

It's been so hot that not even the dog wants to go out. At least that's some sort of relief. Last night Judy and I, and our son Luke, went to Wells Cathedral to hear Sir Willard White sing Porgy and Bess, and Balshazzar's feast. It was a glorious occasion with sunlight streaming through the huge West window in the early evening, lighting up features that are never observed during a daytime visit.
