Minister's Letter

As the Summer approaches I am very much looking forward to taking a major step in my life as I go forward for ordination. My ordination will take place at the Methodist Church annual Conference which this year is to be held in Southport between the 30th June and 7th July. My ordination is due to take place at Leyland Road Methodist Church in Southport on 3rd July at 4pm.

For me this is, in one sense, the culmination of a journey which began in 2006 when I put my name forward as a candidate for Foundation Training. At that time it was required that all prospective candidates for the Methodist ministry undertook foundation training prior to candidating. I then spent a first year at Wesley College Bristol, on Foundation Training, which was designed to help you test and discern your call and to explore the various ministries within the Methodist Church to which you might be called i.e. Ordained ministry (Presbyteral or Diaconal) or various lay ministries.

As I went through the application process for Foundation Training at Circuit and then at District level, I received a great deal of support and encouragement at each stage and especially from my local Church, all of which helped in the process of confirming my call to ministry.

As I undertook the year of Foundation Training, I began the process of candidating for the presbyteral ministry – again coming before the Circuit Meeting, the District Candidate's Committee and the Connexional Candidates Committee – all of whom confirmed my calling through their in depth probing and voting!

I was accepted and given a second year at Wesley College as pre-ordination training, during which I completed a post graduate diploma in Theology and Ministry and served placements in Bath, Newquay and at Severn Beach and Pilning. After leaving Wesley College, I began my two years probationary period in the Burnham on Sea and Weston Super Mare Circuit in September 2009.

Although my ordination is the culmination of this particular process, in another sense it is simply another step in my life-long walk with Jesus Christ. It will mark the beginning of a new phase in my life and ministry in the service of our Lord.

Some people have asked me what I will be able to do as an ordained person that I can't do now. The answer is not much! The Methodist church believes in the "priesthood of all believers". This means that Methodist

Presbyters are not given any special or priestly powers that differ in kind from other church members. The Deed of Union (one of the founding documents of the Methodist Church) (clause 4) states: “Christ’s ministers in the church are stewards in the household of God and shepherds of his flock. Some are called and ordained to this sole occupation and have a principal and directing part in these duties but they hold no priesthood differing in kind from that which is common to all the Lord’s people and they have no exclusive title to the preaching of the gospel or the care of souls. These ministries are shared with them by others to whom also the Spirit divides his gifts severally as he wills”.

So although the Methodist rules say that only ordained Presbyters should normally administer the sacraments, conference can authorise non-ordained people to do so in certain circumstances (hence I have had such authorisation as a not yet ordained probationer and I have the certificates to prove it!)

So – what is a Presbyter? In 2002 the Conference received a whole report exploring that question – if you are interested you can find it online on the Methodist Church web site. To put it briefly – a person ordained in the Methodist church is a “representative person” – representative of the Church, of the priesthood of all believers and of Christ in the world. A quote from the 2002 report says:

“as a perpetual reminder of this calling and as a means of being obedient to it the Church sets aside men and women, specially called, in ordination. In their office the calling of the whole Church is focussed and represented and it is their responsibility as representative persons to lead people to share with them in that calling. In this sense they are a sign of the presence and ministry of Christ in the Church, and through the Church to the world”.

It is this ministry summarised as a ministry of “word, sacrament and pastoral responsibility” that I have embarked upon and continue in as an ordained presbyter.

The process begins for me on Monday 27th June as I travel to Hope University Conference Centre in Liverpool for the Ordinand’s Retreat. On Friday the 1st July I will travel to Southport for the conference which opens on the afternoon of Saturday 2nd with the induction of the President and Vice President. On the morning of Sunday 3rd at 11am the main conference Sunday Worship takes place at which Ordinands are “Received into full Connexion”. On the afternoon at 4pm the Ordination services take place. Tickets for these 3 events are available to order online for anyone coming for the weekend. The Conference then continues for conference representatives, and any ordinands that wish to stay, until Thursday 7th.

At the Ordination service the President will be the Revd Ian T. White (former chair of the Bristol District and also the minister who confirmed me as a member of the Methodist Church 25 years ago!). The preacher is the Revd Jenny Impey.

I know that some of you will be travelling to Southport to support and share with me on this special day and I look forward to seeing you there. However the distance is great and I know that many will not be able to make it, but I hope that you will celebrate with me here in the Circuit at my Testimony Service at 3pm on June 4th at Burnham on Sea Methodist Church. This will be an opportunity to share my journey and to celebrate in the presence of God.

WORLE Local Ecumenical Partnership

The following letter was read on Sunday 15th May at all the Circuit Churches. As a number of members did not follow the reading or understand the implications of the announcement it is printed in full here.

Following two and a half days away, with much prayer and discussion, and with input and talks with the Archdeacon and The Chairman of the Bristol Methodist District, Rural Dean, Circuit Stewards and Ecumenical Officers, the motion below will be brought to the Ecumenical Church Council (ECC) on June 14th, recommending that the Local Ecumenical Partnership (LEP) dissolves and that Worle becomes an Anglican Parish.

The following motion was agreed at the Awayday for members of the ECC and the combined lay leadership teams on May 9th:

For the sake of mission and serving God we feel the right way forward is to disband the formal LEP. Concern was expressed that administrative and financial challenges have reached a point where the pressures are excessive.

If the ECC chooses to follow this way then detailed consideration will need to be given as to the practical issues relating to the ownership of the St Marks buildings and how Methodists might be positively pastored and, if they wish, remain in a worshipping relationship with the Anglican churches with the current parish.

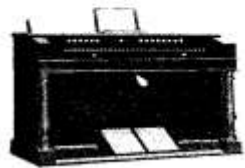

READ:

Psalm 51:1-13

Psalm 51:12

A. 19 year-old Amelia waited in her doctor's office, she recognised the familiar hymn "Softly and Tenderly Jesus Is Calling" playing over the speaker. It made her smile when she remembered the words. Perhaps a song with the lyrics "shadows are gathering, deathbeds are coming" was not the most appropriate background music for a doctor's office!

Watch What You Say

'STEPHANAS, FORTUNATAS, ANDACHAICUS... HAVE BEEN A WONDERFUL ENCOURAGEMENT TO ME.' 1 CORINTHIANS 16:17-18TLB

Most of us have no idea how much other people's emotions, self-esteem and hopes are influenced by what we say. Paul said, 'Stephanas, Fortunatus, and Achaicus... have been a wonderful encouragement to me.' If you've never heard of them, it's because most encouragers hate

being the centre of attention. They're happy to work in a supporting role. But without them very little would get done. The opposite of giving encouragement is spreading discouragement, and Paul says, 'Do not let any unwholesome talk come out of your mouths, but only what is helpful for building others up... that it may benefit those who listen' (Ephesians 4:29 NIV). Jesus said, '...[You'll] give account... by your words you will be justified, and... condemned' (Matthew 12:36-37 NKJV). What you say can never be taken back, and it'll be used as evidence for or against you one day. Dr Thomas Blackaby points out, Words... can leave scars for a lifetime, and many people will never forget some of the things you've said to them, both good things, such as words of encouragement, and bad things, such as criticism and rebuke... Make the best possible use of words so they bring blessings on others.' So, are your words encouraging? Can it be said that there's '...nothing crooked or perverse... in them' (Proverbs 8:8 NKJV)? Ask God to 'Set a guard... over [your] mouth...' (Psalm 141:3 NKJV) so whatever you say glorifies Him and lifts others up.
