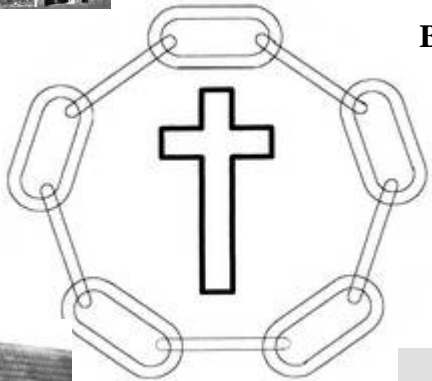

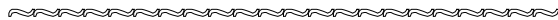

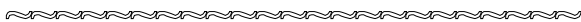

On Saturday January 24th the Huntspill Ecumenical Prayer Group organised their usual Day of Prayer to celebrate The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. The format produced by Churches Together was followed and the day was divided into eight sessions. Each session was led by people from different denominations and the theme for the day was Reconciliation. The material was prepared by the Christian Church in Korea, a country that has been divided since the Korean War.

Each session was focused on areas which are often seen as being major obstacles to our integrated lives in the local communities and

our international relationships as well as the divisions in our Christian lives. We heard how. Difference, Violence, Poverty, Prejudice & Pain can all be seen as major obstacles to Christian Unity. The last session came under the heading of Hope. Hope implies positive thinking about positive change. However, the commentary suggests that after repeated setbacks, it can be easier to shrug our shoulders and suggest there is no point going any further. Do we confuse unity with uniformity, diversity with division? "Unity in diversity can express the diversity of the Trinity and help us to explore the greatness of God" Reading that made me think of the line of the hymn "Bring your traditions richest store..... Explore our visions, pray for more...." (Hymns & Psalms 765) We were certainly all left with a great deal to think about at the end of the day.

A very big Thank You must go to individuals without whom the day would not have happened 1<sup>st</sup> to the speakers who must have spent considerable time and energy preparing their sessions 2<sup>nd</sup> to Christine and Catherine for preparing the wonderful displays of visual aids to focus our minds and aid our thinking. 3<sup>rd</sup> but not least, to all those people who helped with the catering throughout the day.
