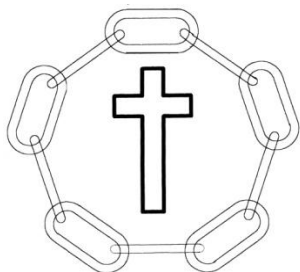

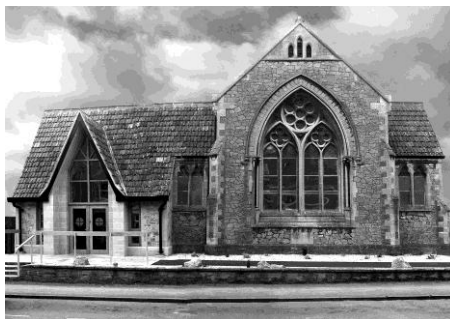

### Unity in Diversity A Course for Lent

What is our Christian Faith? How does this relate to what those of other religions believe, in particular those religions which like ours look back to the tradition of Abraham? How do our practices differ from theirs and perhaps even more important. What do we have in common? These are some of the issues we hope to explore together during Lent this year.

In Churches Together we are fortunate to have the Revd Simon Bale as one of our members. Simon is the curate at S<sup>t</sup>. John's Highbridge but previously worked in Bristol where he had much experience with the Inter Faith Forum ..He has given us much help in planning our programme and has arranged for two speakers to come from the Bristol Group. Valerie Emmott-Russell is a Progressive Jew who is very experienced in multi faith work and she will help Simon introduce the series on March 12<sup>th</sup>.

On March 19<sup>th</sup>.the session will be led by Farzana Saker, a Muslim woman who is a Development Officer for the Bristol Multi-faith Forum. Simon Bale, Richard Allen and I will lead the remaining three sessions in which we shall be looking at our own faith traditions and comparing our practices. We hope to conclude by sharing in a simple meal together and celebrate the Agape or Love Feast with bread and water. This was often used by early Methodists when they met in fellowship without an ordained minister.

All meetings will be held in Burnham Methodist Church starting at 7.30 on March 12<sup>th</sup>. 19<sup>th</sup>. 26<sup>th</sup> April 2<sup>nd</sup>. and 9<sup>th</sup>.

We do hope that we shall have a good attendance from all our churches but especially from our congregations in the Link .If you have any questions about the programme do ask me.

## **GENERAL INFORMATION**

---

The New Room / John Wesley's Chapel is the oldest Methodist building in the world. John Wesley built it in 1739 and enlarged it in 1748. The Chapel was used by John Wesley and the early Methodists as a meeting and preaching place, and it was the centre for helping and educating the needy members of society.

The buildings were restored in 1930, and then survived both the Bristol blitz and the post-war redevelopment of Broadmead. As well as the chapel itself, there are the Preachers' Rooms upstairs which house our accredited Museum.

These are exciting days for The New Room. The Horsefair Project will translate the rather drab courtyard into an imaginative new building, which will provide new visitor facilities, exhibition space, meeting rooms and offices, a resource centre and library to house the New Room's priceless collections, an education room and roof terrace, and a lift to provide all visitors with access to all parts of the Chapel. The preachers' rooms will house a new heritage museum. If you would like further information about the project, please contact The New Room Manager.

The New Room is open to the public Monday to Saturday 10 am to 4 pm. Admission is free but donations are welcome to help with expenses. A small charge is made for guided tours.

There is a regular service of Holy Communion every Friday at 1 pm to 1 15 pm, to which all are welcome.

The service is often followed at 1 20 pm by a short lunchtime concert, recital or talk.

On Saturdays, refreshments are usually available in the Chapel from 10 am to 2 pm.

Other events take place from time to time.

Newsletter - February

Wow! What a difference a year makes, things have become very busy at Foodbank. Our 'food sorts' on Saturday mornings continue to be a hive of activity. Thanks to your generosity, our volunteers are kept busy sorting food and boxing it up, ready to help our clients. A big thank you for all you have given us. So far we have been able to help over 500 people in this financial year

Other Foodbanks have opened in the area, Bridgwater's foodbank opened in the summer and Axbridge-Cheddar in the autumn. These developments were important to us, as we anticipated an increase in demand, partly due to the implementation of changes in the way the benefits system and the previously named Social Fund operate. These changes have meant many more people have been referred to us, so much so that by the end of October we had helped twice as many people as we had in the previous financial year (2012-2013).

We are now open 5 days a week at 4 different venues, (see over). At two of the venues we operate alongside the CAB and other agencies. This means that if anyone is referred to us they can be helped straight away. It also means the client can bring their voucher to one of a number of places to receive their food. Whilst their food parcel is made ready they can stop, have a cup of tea or coffee and, if they wish share something of their story with us and meet a sympathetic ear. We were given a grant from the Somerset Community Foundation to set these up.

In December we said goodbye to two of our trustees Rev Andrew Jackson and his wife Julie. They have moved to Harrow NW London, where Andrew is now the Minister of Harrow Baptist Church

THE FOUNDER of one of the world's most successful companies said, 'The individual who wants to reach the top must appreciate the might and force of habit. He must be quick to break those habits that can break him, and hasten to adopt those practices that will become the habits that help him achieve the success he desires'. This is true in all of life. A dream becomes a reality as the result of your actions, and your actions are controlled mainly by your habits. Speaker and author Robert Ringer says, 'The world is saturated with intelligent, highly educated, extraordinarily skilled people who experience ongoing frustration because of their lack of success. Millions of others spend their lives working hard, long hours, only to die penniless: What's the solution? Ringer says: 'Remember, life is nothing

more than the sum total of many successful years; a successful year is nothing more than the sum total of many successful months; a successful month is nothing more than the sum total of many successful weeks; a successful week is nothing more than the sum total of many successful days. That's why practising successful habits, day in and day out, is the most certain way to win over the long term: You have to take a realistic look at yourself to know where your habits are taking you. If your habits don't line up with your dream, then you need to either change your habits or change your dream. If you want to hold on to your dream, then be prepared to change your habits, because a bad habit never goes away by itself.

So, I did get my article done last month, and I did finish my book. After 35 years I have finally got to the end of reading the Chronicles of Thomas Covenant. Well, there were ten volumes, and the last one only came out in the autumn, but I am glad that I persevered. It is about a man who suffers from leprosy and has already lost part of his hand. Circumstances find him transported to a land of fantasy, a land of great blessing but now being slowly overcome by Lord Foul, the Despiser, who preys upon people's fears and causes despair to ferment; the Land itself is slowly being corrupted. Covenant cannot believe he is in this place but finds that when he is emotionally intense he generates phenomenal power through his platinum 'white gold' wedding ring. But by book six, when the first adventures end he realises that the power lies within himself, and through that power he redeems the Land by sacrificing his own life. At the same time when he returns to this world he finds that his life here is also being sacrificed as he

seeks to save another. The Chronicles are allegorical and we know that the Redeemer has to be raised to life; so it is, and in the fantasy Land Covenant is joined by a woman he knew in the real world who has been shot dead, and by her adopted son. The upshot is that separately and then together, this trinity oppose Lord Foul and all his powers in an effort to bring final redemption and peace to the Land.

Along the way they realise that the only way to do so is to confront their own worst fears, to address those elements of themselves that are most likely to bring “despair”. There is something for ourselves in this. There are many times we shy away from doing the things we know we should. And I guess I feel like that as we look at the issues that arise from the Circuit's Vision project. We know that if the Circuit, indeed if our own churches are to survive in the longer term, we've got to look at ourselves and do something, even if it is only as a step by step process. But it is so much easier to look the other way...

After last year's efforts with giftie things for the successful Craft Fayre the Brean churches held in November, our house is this year being filled up with papier maché. There are days I even have to have breakfast on my knees what with the kitchen table being filled up with an assortment of moulds drying off overnight! So yes the ladies (mainly) are off again. Don't expect anything this year they say, but next year , who knows!. What with the craft group and the book group, the ecumenical activities of the village still continue, even if the worship side is sometimes lacking in support.

We had our church council this week. It's a pastoral event as well, for it is good to chew the fat and to bond together in this way, especially as lunch precedes the meeting. We could not find enough volunteers to fill all our places on the Circuit Meeting however, but then we realised that so many of our members hold circuit appointments that half the church council are on the Circuit Meeting anyway.

Our Christmas coffee and carols event on the Saturday before Christmas was considered such a success that we wanted to have another such morning, this time concentrating on hymns from the new hymn book that we haven't sung before (or not much anyway). We also thought we should buy some mugs for coffee rather than rely on the cups and saucers. So please book that date, we hope you will support us for our New Music/New Mugs coffee morning on Saturday 5<sup>th</sup> April at 10.30am.

Right then. Back to my books. It is such a long time ago since I started, and I missed so many clues on the way through that I thought I should start Mr Covenant's Chronicles again. A book a month perhaps. Nothing you need me for before Christmas is there? Only another 5000 pages to go.
