#### Dear Friends

There has been a significant anniversary recently and one more to come this month. The 24<sup>th</sup> February saw the 1<sup>st</sup> anniversary of the invasion of The Ukraine.



On the 23<sup>rd</sup> March we will remember the 3<sup>rd</sup> anniversary of the day that the 1<sup>st</sup> COVID lockdown was announced by Boris Johnson.



Both of these events continue to impact our economy, our Health Service, our lives, and the life of the Church.

The impact of lockdowns and COVID are ones that have been discussed in all our churches and we are still feeling the effects of the forced lack of activity during this time, the loss of loved ones, and the hard work needed to re-establish the churches place in the community.

The effect of the war in The Ukraine has been more subtle here in the UK. Although there have already been countless (and mainly

unacknowledged) loss of life and injury for Russian and Ukrainian alike, we in this part of Somerset have, in the main, simply watched with horror as the events unfold. Some have welcomed refugees but not everywhere has seen an overflowing of such hospitality.

However, we have felt other impacts of the conflict. Inflation, driven by food and fuel shortages, is at a 40 year high and the increase in our heating bills has been notice by all the Treasurers! In the same way our folks are contemplating the heating of their homes. Many are looking at the forthcoming energy price cap review – with talk of further increases to bills as government help is withdrawn – and wondering how they will be able to manage.

Here the church has been able to take positive action. In Burnham we have been able to use the Waffle Hub as a 'Warm Space' where we heat our building and invite those unable to afford heating at home to come in. This could be done in all churches, and a grant is available from the Methodist Church on a District level to cover some of the associated costs. If there is not a 'Warm Space' in your community this is something you might think about. It is not just a problem for this winter; I suspect that the issues driving prices up will not be quickly resolved.

Whilst we don't call it an anniversary, we are quickly moving forward to the Passion – that time we remember the obedience, suffering, and victory of Jesus. In this time of Lent, we are challenged to look at our lives, to repent of our sinfulness and allow the Living God to direct our very being. Whilst this is a personal reflection of faith, it includes how we interact with and serve others, remembering that when we do things for the very least, we do them 'unto him'. Jesus gave us the ultimate example of this life of goodness and faithfulness. May our lives mirror his model of love.

On 18 April 1930, the BBC's news announcer had nothing to communicate. "There is no news," was the script of the 8:45pm news bulletin, before piano music was played for the rest of the 15-minute segment.

The years take a great toll on us all of course, but this is a great shame, for he has been a much loved preacher. Invariably he would finish his sermons with 'thank you for listening'. And of course, we shall start to see our summer visitors trickling into our midst once again. We shall give Stuart from Cheltenham an even

#### RADIO TIMES 18th APRIL 1930

I looked up that day when the BBC had nothing to report. By then the organisation was just short of 8 years old. It had a single National station plus a couple of Regional ones, and a few Regional variations. To the National band The national one, at least, was transmitted from Daventry in Northants, not a place that trips off the tongue, but which was chosen I guess, because it was high enough up and about as close to the middle of the country as you could get. The programme was not, what you might call, a varied selection. This is the Radio Times listing for the National Programme on that day:

10.15am – The Daily Service

10.30am – Greenwich Time Signal, Weather Forecast, Close Down

3.30pm - Concert with soloists, by The Wireless Military Band

5.00pm - Poetry Reading

5.20pm - Concert, by The Wireless String Orchestra

6.30pm - Sports News

6.50pm – The Service, from St George's Chapel Windsor

7.45pm – BBC Concert – Wagner's Parsifal, conducted by Henry Wood from The Queen's Hall

10.00pm – Close Down

The News, of which there wasn't any, was planned for the interval break in the evening's concert. At this time, the BBC got much of its news from agencies and this day being Good Friday perhaps helps to explain the absence. And, in those days people were still used to

getting their news from Newspapers, so the BBC was not particularly well organised in its news gathering.

The Radio Times covered all these programmes, and more articles in its 60 page weekly magazine which is available on-line. The programmes were a bit more extensive and varied on other days, but not a lot 'Good Evening. Today is Good Friday. There is no news.'

I wonder whether that will hold true for this year.


All are welcome. If possible, please bring a Bible and writing materials.
