Following Covid, our congregation began to consider the church's future; its goals and how to achieve them. Three years have passed. At our latest progress meeting, we felt that significant progress has been made under each of the four Methodist Way of Life elements of Worship, Learning & Caring, Service and Evangelism. In headline terms we have seen: newcomers to worship; a greater warmth in relationships; an increase in service to the community; and more people becoming aware of God's goodness. However, we are in no position to 'rest on our laurels' – there is much more to do. This will be a topic for discussion at Church Council on 3rd March.

A significant amount of the increase in service to the community has been enabled by the Waffle Hub and the Food Bank. In the New Year, the Waffle Hub and the many groups associated with it began to be open on five days a week. Although the Hub, like the Food Bank, is a separate entity from the church and is a charity in its own right, there is a strong connection with the church. The increase in the number of people entering the premises provides opportunities for engaging with the community in Burnham.

Readers will have seen publicity about the Worship Works event to be led by Roger Jones and his team on Saturday 24th March. We are grateful to those who have been praying and preparing for the weekend. It will be a blessing to many Christians in the area. We will also be welcoming Roger as he leads morning worship on the following day.
