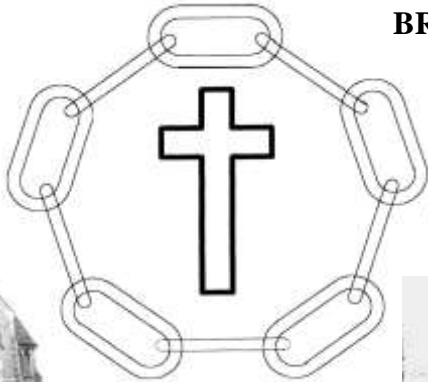

“Why only one cross this year?”

A number of people have asked why there was only one cross on Brent Knoll this Easter. The answer is simple ~ a few days before the crosses were due to be erected, it was discovered that one of the uprights and one of the cross pieces were missing from their storage site. There was insufficient time to buy a replacement.

When we were on the knoll to erect the one cross, the upright was discovered in some bushes, quite a distance from where they are kept. Alongside were the burnt remains of the missing cross piece and some other pieces of old timber from previous crosses.

We hope to have three crosses on the knoll once again next year, providing a witness to the Easter message to passing traffic.

Max Lucado writes: 'The world needs servants. People like Jesus who did not come to be served, but to serve. He chose remote Nazareth over centre stage Jerusalem. His dad's carpentry shop over a marble columned palace. And three decades of anonymity over a life of popularity. He selected prayer over sleep; flawed apostles over obedient angels. I'd have gone with the angels. Not Jesus. He picked people. When they feared the storm. He stilled it. When they had no money for taxes. He supplied it. 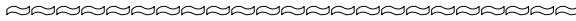
The programme was changed on April 10th. when we had our Members' afternoon with several members reading items or choosing hymns.

Christian Aid Week 13th -19th May 2007

Every year Christian Aid Week enables Churches Communities to focus on the enormous challenge of world poverty. Christian Aid is sponsored by 40 Christian denominations, including the Methodist Church. During this designed week over 300,000 people are involved in the collection of money for the charity, making it an amazing act of Christian unity and witness. The money collected enables Christian Aid to support the work of nearly 600 partners organisations around the world, educating, empowering, caring, promoting peace and changing the world for the better in so many other ways.

Christian Aid this year is concentrating on the effect of climate change on some of the world's poorest regions and poorest people, helping them to get involved in, and to be able to take responsibility for, protecting and developing their own communities.

El Salvador is a small country of 6.7 million people in Central America, it's history has been marked by political violence; civil war raged from 1980 until 1992, leaving 70,000 people dead. In recent years it has suffered a series of hurricanes and earthquakes. The increased frequency and intensity of these hurricanes, earthquakes and subsequent flooding demonstrates the catastrophic effects climate change is having in El Salvador one of the world's poorest countries where, even today, more than half the population have to survive on less than £1 a day.

Christian Aid works with six partner organisations in El Salvador helping people overcome poverty, reduce the spread of HIV, and live with the effects of climate change. The promotional literature gives the example of a typical family. Chus is 15 and lives with his sister and her husband in the San Luis La Herradura area of El Salvador, an area particularly prone to natural disasters. "Strong winds and big waves from the sea definitely causes more floods now " Chus's father died when he was a baby and he only sees his mother occasionally.

He has been brought up by his sister and her husband, and they live in three huts which are close together. Chus's hut, which he shares with the family's livestock, was battered by Hurricane Stan in 2005, which has left holes in the roof. Chus likes to get involved with his community in a very practical way and has been strengthening the local river bank with tyres

and sandbags, in return for some food, under the guidance of Aprondehni, one of Christian Aid's partners. Aprondehni encourages local people to get involved in, to take responsibility for, protecting and developing their own communities. Aprondehni also runs workshops which uses sport and art to help children overcome the traumas of the hurricanes, floods and earthquakes The changing climate is creating a situation that calls for an urgent response.

Archbishop Oscar Rornero worked tirelessly on behalf of the poor people of El Salvador, speaking out against injustice and oppression, which brought him into conflict with the government, leading to his assassination in 1980

He wrote in 1979; " Praying and expecting everything to come from God and not doing anything yourself is not praying. This is not the time to say "It's God will ". Many things happen that are not God's will. When people contribute something of themselves to improve the situation and ask God for the courage to do so, then there is prayer. "With this in mind please pray for the thousands of collectors in Britain during this special week

THE COLLECTORS PRAYER

Lord of life, underneath me are two feet- please may they do this task willingly; In front of me are rows of doors - please may they open to me cheerfully; In my hand are dozens of envelopes - please may they be filled generously; In my heart are millions of needy people - may all I do this week make a world in which they can thrive.

A gift of just £6 to Christian Aid would enable Aprondehni to clean a well after a flood, thus ensuring a supply of clean water for the community, but your support will be giving much more than this. You will also be helping to educate and train people of the local community – people who can make an immediate difference, if only they knew how, especially young people like Chus.

Please, be as generous as you can, with your time, your giving and your prayers to help poor communities around the world have a better future as a result of this Christian Aid Week.

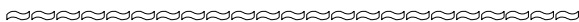

The enemies within

Everybody with a medical condition of any sort is quite prepared to relate (given the chance) how difficult the diagnosis was, the trouble they had, the treatment, the tablets they take and so on and so on.

Now I find that I am no exception - I am well past my sell-by date and, I have not one but several enemies within - I am Diabetic, I have Glaucoma (it has already robbed me of the sight of one eye) I am anaemic, plus various other bits and bobs.

When my wife explains my main ailment to folk they tend to nod and say "Oh yes, Parkinson's"- no, it isn't Parkinson's, it is Myasthenia Gravis

"Never heard of it!" neither had I. It is a rare neurological disease, my GP once told me that one in 50,000 (or was it one in 500,000?) can get it - for the life of me I can't remember which, it doesn't really matter - to put it into simple terms, my immune system has decided that the receptors in the muscles in my body are aliens, mainly in the upper part of my body (particularly the neck and latterly in my arms and legs, and is bent on destroying them) there is no cure - as Bill Bryson might have put it "Someone has to have it" and I drew a short straw.

It began with dreadful neck pains, awful trouble swallowing and having appalling difficulty speaking - without going into detail yes, it took a fair while and many tests in Frenchay Hospital before I was diagnosed. I now take 23 tablets one day and 25 the next day and so on and so on.

How am I affected? I have difficulty walking, I walk with a "wobble" and a walking stick - the former I could well do without, the latter is essential for two reasons [a] to assist my balance and [b] to dispel any thoughts folks may have that I am inebriated [I jest] - rising from a sitting position is difficult, getting into bed is an effort (accompanied by much groaning I'm afraid) My internal "clock" bids me arise at 5 am each and every day whether I like it or not, at this time in the morning I am as bright as a button, my energy tapering off towards evening and by tea-time I am spent; eating the evening meal is a chore, and in the evening unless I have a good book or there is something interesting on the Television {?} I fall asleep very quickly.

Why do I tell you all this? well, as it is a rare disease I thought folk may be interested to know more about it (at first hand as it were) and how it affects those who have it.

Finally, I must emphasise that I am not seeking sympathy in any way, there are folk far worse off than I am, and I think of children in particular.

I have much to be thankful for, I have the care and attention of my wife, my Neurologist, my GP and various Nurses at the Medical Centre (must not forget the many tablets)

Thank you for reading this.
