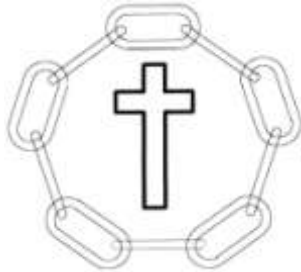

Minister's Letter

What kind of life do you lead? Is it a tidy life where everything is perfect and in its place, or is it a life that is messy - where mistakes are made, where things don't always go according to plan? What about the spiritual dimension of your life?

If we are honest I think most of us would say that our lives are not all perfect and that our spiritual commitment does not always live up to our expectations. For many years a regular and popular speaker at the Greenbelt Festival was Mike Yaconelli, an American pastor and founder of "Youth Spiritualities". In 2001 he published a book called "Messy Spirituality – Christianity for the rest of us"¹. He said "It can sometimes seem as though a close walk with God is only available to candidates for sainthood or those who like living in deserts. But for the rest of us – the ordinary, scattered, busy, over-committed rest of us – it is not really an option".

He suggested that if we think like that then perhaps we have the wrong idea about spirituality. "What if we discovered that our messy, ordinary lives are the very place we are most likely to find God and deepen our knowledge of him?" His book goes on to explore this possibility and approach to spirituality.

More recently through the Fresh Expressions initiative one group of people began to see that the place of the church in today's world has become similarly "messy". The church has moved from being at the centre of society to the edges. It may contain a whole network of connections between people and different groups, ranging from those inside the church, to those who may regularly connect with the church in some way but have no connection with regular Sunday worship. Pete Ward in his book "Liquid church"² says: "when we start to regard the network itself as church, then the notion of insiders and outsiders starts to break down. Instead we have a network of communication and relationship where Christian love and mutual support form part of the flow".

Today it is quite possible that a person might have friends who go to church, might go to the occasional service, might attend the church fair or coffee morning or the mums and toddlers group, but would not consider making any further commitment to regular church. These people are on the fringes of our church community - part of the “messy edge” of our church networks.

“Messy Church” was born out of desire to meet people where they are in their lives and in their spiritual journey. The aim is to take church to those who would not consider coming to the traditional style of church, in a form that fits more easily into an outlook and life style more suited to today’s “messy lives”.

At Burnham we recently made the decision to start a Messy Church which will be held on the first Sunday of each month, beginning on the 6th June. We hope it will be a place for families to share together in learning stories from the Bible through fun activities, to share in a short time of worship and to share in fellowship over a cup of tea and a cake. This is a new venture and we don’t know where it will lead – but we ask for your prayers that it will lead where God wishes us to go.

EASTER OFFERING DEDICATION SERVICE

SUNDAY, 16TH MAY 2010 at VICTORIA.

It may seem a long time to Easter, but those who read the Methodist Recorder may have seen the first instalment of the Lent Course which really focussed my mind!

We are meeting at Victoria again this year, but hopefully we will share hosting this service with Burnham and the Link Churches in future years.

The money raised, about £400 – £450,000 annually through the Easter Offering, goes to the World Mission Fund, and we may not know what the money is used for. Here are some examples:

£20,000 was sent to the Methodist Church of Sri Lanka to help support 50 families who need help following the problems caused by the hostilities between the government forces and the Tamil Tigers. Although peace has been achieved these families still need help with food, counselling, chaplaincy and peace building services.

Another project is in Bangladesh whose aim is to help fund the Ekota (Unity) Project for street children. This has set up the Jokhon Tokhon Centre where the children can drop in at any time. The centre has become a haven for hundreds of youngsters where they receive food, education and do some of the things our youngsters take for granted such as playing games, hanging out or simply having a rest.

Yet another project is “The vision for Benin”, one of the poorest countries in the world, where the Methodist Church, working under the umbrella of the Community of Churches in Mission (Ceeva) has helped develop 9 projects which include social chaplaincy for spreading the gospel, a spiritual retreat and a “Good Samaritan” polyclinic. In addition future work will place more emphasis on human rights, women’s rights, and improving women’s literacy skills. Also planned for 2010 is a youth camp, the development of a pineapple plantation and work on combating HIV and AIDS. £54,000 from World Mission Fund has been given in grants to ensure this vital work continues.

Help is also given to Partner Churches across the world through personnel exchanges, grants, scholarships for future leaders, and Nationals in Mission Appointments (indigenous staff paid for by the Methodist Church).

I hope this gives you some idea of the vast amount of work that the Methodist Church is involved with and that your gifts towards the Easter offering help all sorts of people in all sorts of places throughout the world.

The speaker at this year's service will be Rev'd Sheila MacInally. Tea will be served from 4.30p.m. and the service will start at 6.00p.m. Envelopes for your gifts will be available in the churches at Easter time and we look forward to seeing you on Sunday, 16th May at Victoria.

On Tuesday, March 23rd, Mrs Jean Tinknell gave a thoughtful talk on the meaning of Lent with many little stories of her experiences on the farm and in her neighbourhood.

A very interesting and informative Power Point Presentation given by the Manager of the Recycling Centre at Carrymoor, near Castle Cary told of all the ways of Reducing, Recycling and Reusing waste materials. He showed the Eco House at Carrymoor using all recycled and sustainable materials. We were also told where all the waste products we put out go to the various centres to be recycled - papers are pulped down and are back on the shelves as newspapers within three weeks, tin cans go to Llanelli, S. Wales, food waste is processed with saw dust and is used in agriculture, clothes are sorted in Yeovil etc.
