Saying the right thing the wrong way usually backfires. So here is 'a word to the wise; If you cannot receive constructive criticism, don't try to give it Before you criticise, ask yourself: 1) 'Am I interested in this person's good? Or do you just need to look good, to have all the answers, to control people, and to gain acceptance and prestige? but can't help others while you're focused on your own ego needs. 2) 'Am I blame-oriented and judgemental?' If so, you come across that way to others. '...Let us stop passing judgement on one another.; (Romans 14-13 NFV). To avoid blaming and judging you have to stop talking about why they did it, or who is to blame, or how stupid and selfish and crazy it was, or what's wrong with them, etc. That's problem-focused and polarising, and doesn't help. 3) 'Am I pointing the person toward solutions? God is a God of solutions. When he found us lost in sin He didn't give us a critical reminder of our weakness. Instead, '...When we were still powerless, Christ died for the ungodly' (Romans 5:6 NIV). He didn't give us an analysis of our problem, but a remedy. So, prayerfully suggest, I wonder if you might not get a more satisfying result by..' then let God drive it home! 4) 'Am I speaking truth in love?' Even your sincerest ideas need to reflect that you care. 'Speaking the truth in love.; (Ephesians 4:15 NKJV) opens their heart and prepares them to trust you. Love says. "Because I value you, I'd like to offer a suggestion would that be all right?"

A few days after Easter Sunday:

“Have you heard the good news?” – my friend asked me .

“What good news?” – I replied, concentrating on something else.

“Jesus is alive!” – She responded joyfully.

My feelings after that exchange were a mixture of guilt (that I hadn't immediately understood what she was saying), impatience with myself that my mind was so full of other things that the wonder of Easter had been overtaken by the constraints of everyday life, joy that what she had said was true and a real gratitude to my friend that she had brought me back to the fundamental core of our faith.

Having been senior steward at Burnham for almost my allotted year I can honestly say that there are aspects of the position that seem far removed from faith and the words – ‘Where is God in this?’ seem to have become my personal mantra – and sometimes I have to say to myself that I don't know. But I carry on, aware that if I do something that appears right to others it is God driven and when I get things wrong – well, that is down to me disregarding or misinterpreting the answers to my prayers.

Joyce Pipet told you in last month's issue about the lack of stewards at Burnham from the end of this April. No-one has come forth to fill the vacancies so Joyce and I have asked for volunteers to take on some of the “housekeeping “ tasks in preparation for our services of worship– particularly as there will only be one and, occasionally, no steward on duty. We were thrilled when several people immediately offered to help in any way needed (a big thank you to Harry Kempson who started the ball rolling!) Joyce and I will be getting together soon and developing the stewards, helpers, greeters (and Uncle Tom Cobleigh and all) rotas. What Joy!! On a very positive note – Andrew and the stewards will be meeting with Susan Graham to discuss the future of Burnham with regard to the development of our mission and ministry. This meeting has been facilitated by Ward Jones and we are very grateful for his input.

We have had two excellent fund-raising evenings recently. The first was an evening's entertainment by the Trinity Entertainers from the Yeovil area – a great evening of music and laughter. The second was a choral evening, held at St Andrews Church, by the Cheddar Male Choir with local soloist, Francesca Bowkett. This too was a superb evening. Both concerts were in aid of our heating fund (we have now been given a grant by Viridor and are in the process of applying to Biffa and other possible grant donors for further funding) and both evenings were organised by Dorothy May. We greatly appreciate all Dorothy's hard work.

Over Easter our services were very well attended. Our service on the evening of Maundy Thursday was a communion service and those of us that were there felt the spirituality of the occasion. The Good Friday service was based on the stations of the cross and the single red carnation placed on the communion table was a truly mind-focusing symbol of the crucifixion – as was the symbolic clearing of the communion table and the silent exiting of the church after the Maundy service. Easter Day was the really joyous time with the communion service in the morning and the evening service given to the choir who sang the John Petersen cantata – “The Glory of Easter” which was narrated by Julie Biggs. The choir was joined by some members of the St. Andrews church choir so the congregation consisted of members of both churches and several visiting holiday makers. I think it was a glorious end to our Easter celebrations. And so! I'm back to the “glory of Easter” -

'OK,' I said as we sat drinking coffee after service, 'so what do I put in the Link report this month?' There was stunned silence. Then 'I know' said one, 'Berry's gone to Chernobyl. You could put that in.'

People do an awful lot of good in life but don't make a song and dance of it. But many years ago when the Chernobyl nuclear fiasco alarmed the world and caused incredible damage to people and nature, Fred and Berry's church (they were then in Cornwall) played host to a group of children from the stricken area, giving them a respite from the tragedy and an assurance that the world cared about what had happened to them. Since coming to the Burnham area, Fred and Berry have kept in touch with their Cornish friends and now Berry has taken up the opportunity to travel to Eastern Europe for ten days to meet up with their contacts again. They will find things still very primitive out there so it will not be a comfortable trip at any level. Berry is due back soon after this edition of the Link is published and I'm sure will have much to tell us. I guess the Church calls this **Mission**, though I am not a fan of the word for that makes it sound like a calculated discipline; I am simply touched by the uncalculated way people respond in love to the needs of the world around them.

Then Judy and I added our two pennyworths to the conversation, we had been to a friend's party the previous evening at Mark Village Hall. It was announced as her 79years and 361st day birthday and the central feature of the evening was to be a fun casino run by Weston Lions Club. We were each given 5 tokens (called chips) and there we were among 120 people wondering quite what to do with them. People were given the opportunity to buy more chips with the proceeds from the sale going towards funding the Avalon Camps for deprived children from Bristol, a charity that has been run by another friend of ours for the last 25 years. The camps are held for two weeks in the summer using a field on the outskirts of the village. Judy won rather a lot of these chips, and then gave them away before we left. Some might say this whole evening presented us with a **moral question**. Well, discuss. We didn't need to, for to us, the party was the gracious invitation from a friend, and our response was simply thank you, we'd love to come and share fully in the celebration.

Finally it was Celia's turn to add to the conversation which she did by adding a touch of humour to a potentially serious problem. A few months ago she moved round the corner to a new house and in the process has had work done to her conservatory. One day in the last week or so her carbon monoxide alarm went off. Her neighbour was called and then the gas company. When the gas man arrived his meter went berserk and he ordered Celia out. 'The last time my meter went this high' he said, 'we evacuated the whole street!' Neighbours were helpful and supportive, even if a little concerned for themselves too. Eventually the problem was traced to the floor of the conservatory and finally disappeared though Celia was understandably on edge for a couple of days. I guess the church would like to put this into another category, that of **Health and Safety**. In practice though it was an issue that caused concern and disruption but which was solved on the spot with the help of neighbours and others.

After all that news and discussion, nobody seemed to want to take away the latest edition of Mission Matters!

It is surprising what you can talk about round the coffee table! And how relevant that can be to the issues of the day. But do we come to church just to worship? There is more to the fellowship of the church than that. The success of the Link churches in the 1980s owed much to personal invitation to those outside the direct influence of the church to be part of the wider fellowship without having a specified commitment to it.

Our joint service this month is at S^t Bridget's and Rev Andrew has been asked to take the whole service himself including communion. It is something of a milestone and we wish Andrew well.
