I'm not sure it happens so much now but for years teams of us from local churches would go from door to door delivering and collecting envelopes. sometimes engaging in (usually) friendly conversation about the work and purpose of Christian Aid. It was just something we did, but who or what prompted us to do it? And on that May evening in Aldersgate Street, what was it that caused John Wesley to feel his 'heart strangely warmed'? And, perhaps more trivially, when the winners of the Eurovision Song Contest and their compatriots, and the winners of the FA Cup and their supporters, find themselves cheering, hugging, shouting and singing in moments of ecstatic joy, what's all that about? I don't believe we can contain the Holy Spirit in a religious cocoon, but recognise and rejoice in its (some would say her) presence and potential in all areas of life and living, encouraging and even expecting those of us who call ourselves Christian to be vessels of the unity, hope and joy that are in God's loving heart.

LINK FELLOWSHIP

The speaker for April's meeting was Pastor Jade, from Hope Baptist Church.

When it was the World Day of Prayer on the first Friday in March, she had given a brief account of her trip to the Holy Land, which was so relevant, as the service this year had been prepared by the women of Palestine. And those of us who heard her then hoped that she might come to tell us more.

Her visit had taken place a year ago as part of her training at Bristol Baptist College, and she spoke very movingly about how their visit had interwoven seeing Biblical sites with the obvious tensions between Jews and Palestinians. Personally, I was shocked when she said that during their stay the Israeli Parliament had passed a law saying that it was permissible for Jews to spit on Christians, and that they had been spat at. Suddenly one of our members saw the time as she had said she needed to leave at the end of the meeting, and we realised that it was past the time we usually broke for our afternoon cup of tea! We had been totally absorbed in her narrative that time had sped by. At that point she had just reached the stage of their trip where they arrived at Jerusalem, so we have already booked her to return to our October meeting to conclude her fascinating insights. She asked that in the meantime we would continue to pray for peace to come to that land.

I was unable to say what our next meeting would be as I was waiting on a reply from Rev. Rod Ingrouille. He will come in June, so I thought that for our May meeting we could share readings/ poems about summertime, or holidays – or share memories of memorable holidays.

That meeting will be on Tuesday May 14th at 2.30pm at East Brent Hall. All are welcome.

RAPESEED

Visit to a Rapeseed oil farm

Judy and I recently visited Fussels, a farm on the outskirts of Frome. We were part of a group of about a dozen, members of a Food & Wine Society to which we belong. As it happened the visit took place a couple of days after Earth Day, an international day in which ecology takes pride of place. The brothers who run the enterprise are clearly dedicated to running their business along relevant lines

Andy runs the agricultural side. He led us to one of their fields and guided us through the cycle of production from sowing the seed in early August through the early months (winter has been good for the crop this year as was clear from the vibrant state of the bright yellow blossom that confronted us as we surveyed the crop in one of his large fields. Soon now, that blossom will drop away and the pods of seed will begin to appear. Harvesting will take place in early August and the rootstock will be ploughed up immediately ready for the next year's cycle to commence. But not with more rapeseed. It has taken too much goodness away from the soil, and they are not keen on chemicals. Instead, maize will be next year's crop and rape will be grown elsewhere on the farm. Wheat and barley and even fodder, can also be used on a four- or five-year rotation, all part of their drive to keep their business as close to nature as possible. We talked about many things in the production of rapeseed, from the density of the crop (as Andy said, just because a field looks thick with rape blossom doesn't mean that that is the most productive way, for each plant will grow according to the space available as well as the state of the soil). And we also looked at the bugs and other pests that affect the plants; not all bugs are harmful, and Andy's view is that, as long as bugs can be kept under control, it is best to leave them, rather than take the draconian stance of destruction.

The brothers process the seed themselves on their premises. It is stored until needed, some of it for a full year; and is then cold pressed to ensure that the oil is in best condition, before being bottled. Tim, the other brother, showed us round this part of the operation and then demonstrated the bottling

process during which herbal flavours are added. Some of the oil is also smoked. He then fed us with some snacks he had made using different varieties of the oil. Gorgeous, it was all the encouragement we needed to make use of their shop next door Judy had never been keen on Rapeseed oil in her cooking - smells and tastes a bit like cabbage she says, which course is natural because Rape comes from the same family of brassicas. But the end product that the Fussel brothers produce is very different. They are very keen to show people round their farm and inside premises. If you get chance, go; you will be well informed and entertained. At this time when we embrace Earth Day it seemed to me to be a good example of humans and nature working together. ECO CHURCH

East Brent and Brean churches are the proud possessors of the Eco Church bronze award. The Bristol District of our Church encourages all churches to get involved in the concept

Here are some notes from the Spring edition of the Eco District Newsletter. They illustrate the wide variety of ways in which churches can be involved:

- Over half the churches in the Bristol District are registered with the District Organisation and 55 have gained an award. St Mark's church, Cheltenham have recently been awarded the silver status having done much to insulate the church and to install a solar PV array on the roof; and the Junior church members have erected bug boxes to make the place more wildlife friendly. Stonehouse and Thornbury churches have also been granted silver awards;
- Nailsea church ran a community Eco fair which involved twenty organisations engaged in environmental work in the area, including the management of wildlife and rewilding areas, gardening advice, maintenance of dry stone walls and other matters, climate challenges, energy saving. More than 170 people attended the fair.
