Minister's Letter

It is the time of year again when change is upon us. The leaves fall, the days get shorter, the central heating comes on (or we begin to feel the lack of it!), and we find ourselves having to wrap up warm.

We may mourn the passing of summer (even a fairly damp one) but we cannot prevent its passing into history. This is because it is part of God's plan in creation for a world which constantly changes and moves on. Some changes happen slowly over time – like the formation of stalactites in the caves of the Mendip hills. Other changes happen suddenly like the demise of the dinosaurs – (if you saw the BBC programme “Planet Dinosaur”, you will have seen how this was caused by a huge meteor which landed in the Gulf of Mexico and which caused such devastation across the planet that 60% of life on the planet was wiped out in a short space of time).

One of the difficulties they faced was their inability to adapt to the rapidly changing climate and conditions which affected the food chains. Those species which were able to adapt survived. Of course, if the dinosaurs had not become extinct, it is doubtful whether human beings would have evolved!

So, while we may not like change – we have to accept its inevitability and grasp the God given opportunities which it presents to us. Or maybe, like the dinosaurs, we too will become extinct!

One change which we face in church at this point is the publication of the new authorised hymn book for Methodism: “Singing the Faith”. Most of the Link churches have at this point purchased copies, and we look forward to grasping this opportunity to broaden our musical horizons and further enrich our worship with hymns and songs from a wide range of sources.

This is also the time of year for Remembrance and on Sunday 13th November at our Remembrance services we will remember those who have been lost through war, and those who are left behind.

The First World War was termed “the Great War” and was to be “the War to end all Wars”. This turned out to be a vain hope that human beings would put aside their lusts for power, their greed and selfish desires and instead look for peaceful solutions to their differences in a spirit of tolerance and reconciliation.

There is cause for hope though because of Jesus Christ. What we cannot achieve for ourselves we can achieve through him: “In the presence of death Christ offers us sure ground for hope and confidence and even for joy,

because he suffered our human life and death, was raised again triumphant and lives for evermore. In him his people find eternal life” (from the Methodist Worship Book).

We may consider with mixed feelings the manner of the ending of hostilities in Libya and look forward with hope of a lasting peace in that country; while we continue to remember those risking their lives in Afghanistan and the families of those who have lost loved ones.

May God Bless You – those you love and those who will not be forgotten.

In his church duties, he was the same and I remember him as a reliable friend and am sure he will be very much missed to all the residents of Brean, both Methodists and villagers.

Pakistan Floods



The Methodist Church in Britain has launched an appeal for the people of Pakistan as the number of flood victims continues to rise.

The Church of Pakistan called for help after torrential monsoon rains fell over the southern Sindh province, destroying livelihoods and spreading disease. More than 7.5 million people have been affected by the disaster and the number could still rise. Four church staff in the Raiwind Diocese have died of dengue fever and the epidemic has claimed many more lives across the region.

Steve Pearce, partnership coordinator for Asia and the Pacific, said, “The scale of the disaster is huge. These are the people who were also flooded last year, so some of them have not yet got their livelihoods back in order. The Church of Pakistan is in a position to help. Pakistani Church leaders have met with local government officials and that is important because Pakistan is an Islamic state where Christians are a minority.”

The Methodist Church's World Mission Fund has given £20,000 to the Church of Pakistan. The Church's response is helping to dispel negative connotations surrounding Christians in Pakistan who have been oppressed because of their beliefs and their associations with the West.

People can donate to the Pakistan Appeal launched by the World Mission Fund via the Methodist Church Just Giving web page or by sending a cheque payable to the World Mission Fund to Steve Pearce, World Church Relationships, at Methodist Church House, 25 Marylebone Road, London, NW1 5JR. Postal donations should be labelled 'Pakistan Appeal'. UK taxpayers can increase their donation by including a completed Gift Aid form.

The Methodist Church's children and youth assembly, 3Generate, takes place at the Pioneer Centre, Cleobury Mortimer, in Shropshire 4-6 November 2011. Three streams provide appropriate activities for 9-13 year olds, 14-17 year olds and 18-23 year olds.

Programme highlights include singer-songwriter and director of the Christian Socialist Movement Andy Flanagan and Lat Blaylock, a writer and educator with a passion for making RE come alive. Also on the bill is Jamie Hill. After touring with bands like Why? and Quench, Jamie is now the Youth and Student Manager at the Bible Society, enthusing young people with a big vision of what the Bible can be.

There'll be cutting edge music from MOBO award-winning gospel rapper Guvna B; one of the leading lights of the next generation of UK gospel rappers, Tunday; and the unique Leke, with a heart for worship.

3Generate helps the Church to hear from children and young people, and for children and young people to hear from each other, have fun, find support, learn from one another and make a contribution to the wider Church.

Everyone will also get to use the adventure area, complete with climbing towers, bouldering walls, high ropes, indoor archery, raft-building, bridge-building and much more.



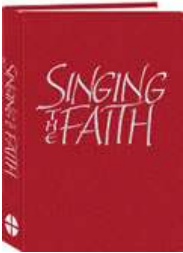
Citizens Advice Bureau: coming to a church near you

Citizens Advice is working with churches and other places of worship across the country to make advice services more accessible, particularly for those living in remote areas. This will provide face to face advice in the local community rather than users having to travel significant distances.

Faithful Advice: A guide for advice services in places of worship provides practical examples and guidelines for churches to set up face to face advice sessions on their premises. As public sector cuts bite, churches can play a vital role in offering premises for advice sessions, particularly where there are no alternative sites available locally.

There are examples of churches already being used such as Nailsea Methodist Church in North Somerset saving people a 20 mile journey. East Lindsey CAB, working with Spilsby Methodist Church in Lincolnshire, was successful in securing funding to develop part of the church as a community centre.

Graham Jones, rural officer for the Methodist Church and the United Reformed Church based at the Arthur Rank Centre said, “Our hope is that these guidelines will help develop this relationship and lead to a growing number of churches acting as partners and hosts in this way. Building on previous guidelines encouraging churches to host post offices and community shops, here is further evidence of the churches’ commitment to playing their part in meeting the needs and challenges of rural and isolated communities.”

Singing the Faith Plus is the website companion to the Methodist Church’s brand new hymnbook.

Designed to offer additional hymn search facilities, and further information about each hymn, the site will also reflect the faith that Methodists sing about every week of the year.

It will be a home for the new hymns that continue to be written now Singing the Faith itself is complete and available. And alongside new texts, the site offers articles, questions for discussion, reviews, events information, interviews with hymn writers, suggestions for how to use hymns and songs ...

Here, anyone who loves hymns, songs, singing and music can have a voice, express an opinion, and explore further the creative life of sung worship.



The Red Book: a major report from Action for Children shows those most in need have increasing difficulties finding help

This report, from a Methodist charity, shows that reductions in funding are being translated into reduction in the prospects of vulnerable children. It is the result of a year-long research project into effects of government spending decisions. The conclusions are simple and disturbing. The need for children's services is rising, and the capacity of children's services is falling.

The effects of the cuts on the most vulnerable have been of huge concern to Methodists over the past year. The Red Book is an excellent resource for people wishing to inform themselves.

The Action for Children website has more information and opportunities for people to take practical actions.

Podcasts: released once a month and downloadable from the D:Sign website. These offer windows into people's experience of leading people to following Jesus.

Live, as God Intended

'HIS DIVINE POWER HAS GIVEN US EVERYTHING WE NEED...' 2 PETER 1:3 IMIV

The Bible says, 'His divine power has given us everything we need for life and godliness... For this very reason, make every effort to add to your faith goodness; and to goodness, knowledge; and to knowledge, self-control; and to self-control, perseverance; and to perseverance, and godliness; and to godliness, brotherly kindness; and to brotherly kindness, love. For if you possess these qualities they will keep you from being ineffective and unproductive...' (2 Peter 1:3-8 NIV). Here are ten scriptural principles to help you live, as God intended: 1) Guard your tongue. Always say less than you think and others will respect you. 2) Make promises sparingly, keep them faithfully, and people will trust you. 3) Never let an opportunity pass to say a kind word, and some day you will look back with joy and not regret 4) Be genuinely interested in others; show it by listening attentively and expressing your appreciation. 5) Be cheerful. Don't dwell on your aches and pains; everybody has trouble. There are people in the nearest hospital who would gladly swap places with you. 6) Keep an open mind and try to get all the facts. Discuss, but don't argue. Learn to disagree without being disagreeable. Give other people the benefit of the doubt. 7) Discourage gossip, it's destructive. 8) Be sensitive to the feelings of others. Live so that nobody will believe them. 10) Don't worry about getting the credit, just keep giving your best and be patient God records and God rewards!

THE BIBLE IN ONE YEAR:

Isaiah 62-64

1 Timothy 1

Quaker John Woolman was an itinerant preacher who waged his own personal campaign to end slavery in colonial America. Woolman met with slave owners to speak of the injustice of holding other human beings as property. Although Woolman did not eradicate slavery completely, he did persuade many roasters to free their slaves. His success was due to individual, personal persuasion.

The book of Philemon contains a similar one on one appeal. Onesimus was a runaway slave who had escaped from his Christian master Philemon.

- Onesimus had come to faith through Paul's ministry, and now Paul was sending him back to Philemon with these words: "Perhaps he departed for a while for this purpose, that you might receive him forever, no longer as a slave but more than a slave -- a .eloved

brother" (vv.15-16). Although we don't know if Onesimus was set free from slavery, his new faith in Jesus had changed his relationship with his Christian master. He was now also a brother in Christ Paul was influencing his world one heart at a time.

By the transforming power of the gospel, people and situations can change. Like Woolman and like Paul, let's seek to influence our world one heart at a time. ---

Our church and schoolroom were 'packed to the rafters' for the funeral of Stuart Hicks, early in October. Family, farming and community members were there in force to remember and pay their respects to a man who had graced the village, his church and his profession throughout his long life.

It is difficult to give full credit to the impact and influence that Stuart gave to the life of our church. He had seen it through the good times and had given a steady and encouraging hand when numbers declined. He had been a loyal supporter of Circuit, Link and Ecumenical friendship. He was proud of the history of the church and traced his family's connection with it all the way back to the visit of John Wesley in the 18th Century; he was doggedly determined that it should continue during his own lifetime and beyond.

But he was also a committed parishioner. He served for many years as a Parish Councillor and on the committee formed to build the Village Hall in the mid 1970s (even though that would mean less income for the Methodist Hall). It was good to hear him talk about life in the community in his younger days.

Above all he was a family man and was proud of all that the next generations have achieved and are achieving.

His funeral service was conducted by Rev Andrew, and Rev Margaret gave a splendid eulogy.

In the middle of the month we held our Church Council. We covered all the usual bases and set out our calendar for Christmas and beyond. We welcomed Fred Jenkins as a new steward and acknowledged with grateful thanks, the gift of a set of the new hymn books. The books have already been put to good use.

Our Harvest Festival was a very happy occasion. The church had been beautifully decorated and we were joined by our Anglican friends and a few visitors for the service which was ably conducted by Rev Carol Gill. About 40 sat down to an excellent lunch and to chat. A good day!

Towards the end of the month we learned of the death of Walter Godwin. Wal had been a member at Brean for more than thirty years. He had been active on our Church Council and regularly supported our Ecumenical activities. He was proprietor of a caravan site in Brean, but his profession previously had been in the jewellery trade. So he enjoyed the cut and thrust of business, as we found out to our advantage when he and Stuart negotiated on our behalf the time we bought a new organ for the church. He is much missed by us all.
