Dear Friends

The liturgy for this time of year moves away from the season of Pentecost and prepares for Advent, which begins at the end of this month. There are a number of church festivals in November that encourage us to remember. We have All Saints, All Souls, the festival of Christ the King; and in between we have Remembrance Sunday.

- All Saints reminds us that we are part of a worldwide church, and we give thanks for the ordinary 'saintly' Christian men and women who worshipped and prayed often in the same churches as we do today who have gone before us.
- All Souls allows us a moment of reflection as we remember with thanksgiving all those who have died. It offers us a window into God's heart of compassion for those who grieve and mourn. It reminds us too that we have a Saviour who has overcome the sting of death and provided for us the promise of eternal life.
- Remembrance Sunday focusses these thoughts on the sacrifice made by many for the country, freedom, and security we now enjoy. These acts of remembrance on the Sunday and on Armistice Day itself have grown in significance once more this century.
- The festival of Christ the King reminds us that for us all things are set in a faith that has a Saviour who is the King of Kings and Lord of Lords, our Saviour, Prophet, Priest, and King. He will return to restore God's Kingdom.

In this period of reflection, memories, and thanksgiving it is good to be reminded that there is life beyond ourselves, and sometimes we need to stop and reflect that there is more to life than this present moment. This is a time to reaffirm that we believe that things will change, and that we will see a new creation. This is a time to share with each other joys and tears alike. This is a time to remember that Advent proclaims 'the light of the world has come', and he is still the hope for our world?

As highlighted last month, October has seen the installation of our new video equipment. The first week was very experimental as we sought to find how best to use the machine. Fortunately, John was the preacher on that day and as he was the one who knows about such things we were glad to use his experience. It might yet take a while to conclude our experimentation but to have such flexibility in the way we conduct services and other events is surely very satisfying.

We also had our Church Council in October. Useful discussions, general appreciation for all those who administer the affairs of our church, and a general willingness to look forward in hope. Our building is in reasonable state, leaks have all been repaired and redecoration where paintwork behind the pulpit was damaged, is in hand. It was also pleasing to learn that there are now 137 'followers' who regularly read our Facebook page, 60% of whom live within 10 miles.

A number of us attended the Link meeting on 25th and were pleased to hear positive reports on the new arrangements in the group. The meeting welcomed opportunities to worship together and that we all support each other in events as far as possible and when time permits.

For ourselves, we shall attend Remembrance Day worship at St Bridget's on 13th November (at 10.50am but check nearer the time), but other services will all be in our own church at the usual time of 10.30am. Our Christmas events are on Saturday morning 17th December (Coffee and Carols), and Christmas Eve for our usual informal Carol service at 4pm. We usually get thirty to forty people joining us and hope we shall see you with us on these occasions. And for those who are energetic enough, we now have a bike rack installed at the rear of the building; its installation has helped us to achieve Bronze Level status in the Eco church scheme. In addition this year we shall hold weekly Advent groups, conducted by our minister at our house in Brean; all are invited but see Link for specific times.

Meanwhile make the most of November. With all the restriction on fuel and the cost of everything, we are aware it will be a difficult time for many of us.
