

COMPASS BRAILLE

It was in 1996/7 that the Bristol District had as a “Special” Project to raise money for Compass Braille. Here in Burnham and the Link section we gave our full support with money raising efforts.

In 1990 the work had been set up in a disused Methodist Chapel at Mortonhamstead Devon.

At the time Beth and I went down to understand the work and I began speaking on behalf of Compass Braille. We were graciously received. At the time there was a project for producing Bibles in Braille for Indian Languages.

In the last few months support has been given for a new Braille School in Bartimai for the Visually Handicapped, Mission to the Blind and Ephphatha Blind Mission. In May a request was received from Malta for help for a seven year old who lost his sight when he was five. 64 Gospels have gone to Rwanda and 60 complete NT's for Nepal.

Now the time has come for Compass Braille to relocate from Mortonhampstead to Ware in Hertfordshire. Here there will be more space and a central location with good access to the A10 and M25 as well as the Airports of Stanstead and Heathrow.

As Compass Braille leave Devon we continue to pray for the work of Translation and give our support.

Suddenly all the children rushed to one side. Cinderella had entered. She stood waist deep in kids, each wanting to be touched. Kenny turned toward the other side of the castle. It was now vacant, except for a boy; his age was hard to determine because of the disfigurement of his body...he stood watching...longing to be in the middle of the kids reaching for Cinderella. But can’t you feel his fear; fear of yet another rejection? Fear of being... mocked again? Don’t you wish Cinderella would go to him? Guess what? She did! She walked across the floor, knelt at eye level with the stunned little boy and placed a kiss on his cheek. “I thought you would appreciate the story,” Kenny told me.

‘I did. It reminded me of another one. The names are different, but isn’t the story the same? Rather than a princess of Disney, it’s the Prince of Peace. Rather than a boy in a castle, it’s a thief on a cross. In both cases a gift was given. In both cases love was shared. In both cases the lovely one performed a gesture beyond words. So the husband and wife set a small table in the corner. There, Grandfather ate alone while the rest of the family enjoyed dinner.

Since Grandfather had broken a dish or two, his food was served in a wooden bowl!

When the family glanced in Grandfather's direction, sometime he had a tear in his eye as he sat alone.

Still, the only words the couple had for him were sharp admonitions when he dropped a fork or spilled food.

The four-year-old watched it all in silence. One evening before supper, the father noticed his son playing with wood scraps on the floor. He asked the child sweetly, "What are you making? Just as sweetly, the boy responded, "Oh, I am making a little bowl for you and Mama to eat your food in when I grow up." The four-year-old smiled and went back to work.

The words so struck the parents so that they were speechless. Then tears started to stream down their cheeks. Though no word was spoken, both knew what must be done

That evening the husband took Grandfather's hand and gently led him back to the family table. For the remainder of his days he ate every meal with the family. And for some reason, neither husband nor wife seemed to care any longer when a fork was dropped, milk spilled, or the table cloth soiled.

I've learned that, regardless of your relationship with your parents, you'll miss them when they're gone from your life. I've learned that making a "living" is not the same thing as making a "life."

I've learned that life sometimes gives you a second chance.

I've learned that if you pursue happiness, it will elude you. But if you focus on your family, your friends, the needs of others, your work and doing the very best you can, happiness will find you.

I've learned that even when I have pains, I don't have to be one.

I've learned that every day, you should reach out and touch someone. People love that human touch - holding hands, a warm hug, or just a friendly pat on the back.
