# Minister's Letter

The signs of Autumn are upon us. The leaves are beginning to turn a beautiful range of colours (time to visit Westonbirt?); the days are drawing in quickly; those annoying “Daddy Longlegs” are trying desperately to get into every nook and cranny of our homes!

This is the time of year when we can look forward to Fireworks, Carnival, Halloween and Advent. It is also the time when many Methodist Ministers begin to prayerfully consider what the future holds and where God will lead them next in Ministry.

As many of you know, Methodist appointments are for five years in the first instance, and my five years in the Weston Super Mare and Burnham on Sea Circuit will come to an end at the end of July 2014. As I came here as a probationer and this was my first appointment in ministry, I have chosen not to ask for an extension to the appointment and so Julie and I will be moving on next August.

I have had several questions asked already about how the change happens and so I thought I would outline the process for you now:

At the end of September (i.e. now) those Ministers who will be moving the following August, prepare a profile about themselves. This details our family situation, our past experiences, theological outlook and approach to ministry.

At the same time the Circuit Stewards of those Circuits across the Connexion, who will require a Minister for next September, write a profile detailing the requirements of the Circuit and giving an outline of the post to be filled. This would include details of the churches in the section, the Circuit set up, the priorities for the next five years and the accommodation. These profiles go to the Chair of District.

The profiles are all published in a “book” in October, and Minister's and Circuit Stewards then have the chance to look through and identify possible matches or preferences, which are then communicated to the Chair of District.

This information is then fed into the Connexional “Stationing Matching Group” which meets in November, December and January. At these meetings a complicated process takes place which aims to match Ministers to vacancies. There is no guarantee that a match will be made in the first round - hence the Matching group meets more than once. Once a match has been made then visits of the Minister to the Circuit are arranged immediately.

The visit is to allow the Circuit and the Minister to discern whether the match made is right. It is not an interview or test, but an opportunity to meet, have a conversation and a mutual exploration. Two days are then allowed for prayer and further conversation before a mutual decision is made. If the decision is positive then the Circuit formally invites the Minister to take up the station. If the decision is negative then the profiles go back to the next round of the Matching Group, but since a great deal of time and effort is put in to prayerfully make “the best possible match of skills and graces” - it is hoped that this will be the exception.

The appointment is not officially confirmed until Conference meets in July and formally approves the stations, but assuming all is well, the removal vans will be on the road at the beginning of August.

Julie and I are just at the beginning of this process - so your prayers would be much appreciated.

I say tasting because, let me explain. Daily there were at least 20 venues each with a rolling programme of events starting at 8-9am until midnight!

And these offered a very comprehensive mix of worship, music, performing arts, visual arts, comedy, talks and discussions catering for a very wide spectrum of tastes. Some of the events were especially aimed at the many children who were attending.

She has had several experiences when she was not expected to live. Yet Linda is the most vibrant,

grateful and cheerful person you will ever meet. She once told me that her mission field, as she hoped and planned, is the hospital. But instead of serving God as a doctor, she serves Him as a patient. No matter how sick she is, the light of the Lord radiates from her. Linda exemplifies the teaching of the apostle Peter. Despite her trials, she rejoices, and the genuineness of her faith brings "praise, honour and glory" to Jesus Christ (1 Peter 1:6-7). ---Julie Ackerman Link

**GROWING IN FAITH**  
**.FAITH COMES BY HEARING, AND HEARING**  
**BY THE WORD OF GOD.'**  
**Romans 10:17 NKJV**

IF YOU want to know how strong your faith is, pay attention to what's coming out of your mouth. '...The word which they heard did not profit them, not being mixed with faith in those who heard it' (Hebrews 4:2 NKJV). It's not enough to read God's Word; you must internalise it, and then vocalise it. We say all kinds of things, but the truth is that we don't really believe them because they don't show up in the way we live. You should live in such a way that if God is not who He says He is, you'll fall flat on your face. This means:-

- 1) Looking for opportunities to trust God more.
- 2) Trusting Him to come through for you regardless of the situation.
- 3) Strengthening your faith for the tough times ahead. And here's

how you do it 'Faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God.' If someone could stick a thermometer under your tongue and take your spiritual temperature, the thing that would cause it to rise or fall would be the time you have spent in God's Word. You say 'Right now my faith is very low.' Then start spending more time reading God's Word. You say, 'I wish I had the faith of so-and-so.' There's no mystery about how to close the gap between your faith and that of others just spend more time in the Scriptures. Rearrange your priorities, take control of your time and put Bible reading at the top of your to-do list if you're serious about growing in faith, it's a price you must be willing to pay.
