

Name Methodist Toddler Group

We are a church outreach group serving all of our community and embrace equality and diversity.

Aims

To provide a social setting where mums, dads, and carers can support each other and their pre-school children in a safe environment

To encourage adults and children to have fun and be a friendly welcoming inclusive group.

To encourage children to mix, learn, and share through play and various activities as a stepping stone to school.

Activities

Provision of large assortment of age appropriate and safe toys, soft toys, books, ride on toys, prams, slide, swing, tent, educational toys, puzzles.

Craft activities

Various age appropriate seasonal, topical, and festive craft activities are offered with staff support throughout the year.

Table top activities and simple play crafts e.g. play doe are available every week.

Festivals/Church involvement

At present we have a Christmas service in the church each year followed by a party with Father Christmas.

Information on all appropriate church activities including festivals, Sunday club, and messy church are given to parent/carers attending our group.

Session entrance fee

Parent/carers are asked to pay £1 per group/family this includes unlimited refreshments from 9.45am to 11.00am.

Health & Safety

Risk assessments covering six areas have now been completed one of which was mentioned in the minutes of the church council meeting 15-6-10.

R.A. documents available to read on request.

Paul Creswick (Organiser) now represents "Methodist Toddler Group" on the church council.

H&S sign has also been generated to compliment R.A on hot drinks.

Harry's Column

HE WILL SIT LIKE A REFINER OF SILVER "Malachi 3:3 NLT

Are you in the refiner's fire today? If you are don't rebel or try to run away, just sit still and let the refiner do His work. The Bible says: 'He will sit like a refiner of silver, burning away the dross. He will purify [them], refining them like gold and silver, so that they may once again offer acceptable sacrifices to the Lord.' A woman who read this verse at a Bible study wanted to know how it related to her walk with God, so she made an appointment with the silversmith. Without mentioning anything other than a general interest in the process, she sat and observed him work. She watched as he held the silver over the fire, explaining that in order to burn away every impurity he had to keep it in the middle where it was hottest. She asked him if he usually sat in front of the fire the entire time. 'Yes,' he replied, 'not only do I have to hold it, I must watch it if I leave it there too long it will be destroyed.' After thinking about that for a while she asked, 'How do you know when the process is complete?' Smiling, he replied, That's easy; I see my face reflected in it.'

If you're in the refiner's fire today, remember a) He knows what He's doing, so trust Him b) He won't allow you to be destroyed by the circumstances, or take His eye off you c) when the process is complete, you'll be more like Jesus and less like your old self. Isn't that what you want? Isn't that what you've prayed for?

GUILTY OF PLENTY

READ:

1 Timothy 1:12-17

The grace of our Lord was exceedingly abundant. 1 Timothy 1 - 14

The Bible in one year: Job 5-7 Acts 8:1-25 A man was filling out a job application when he came to the question "Have you ever been arrested?" He wrote' "No" The next question, intended for people who had answered "Yes" to the previous question, was "Why?" The applicant answered it anyway: "I never got caught," He evidently knew he was guilty of plenty!

So was the apostle Paul. He knew he had personally done wrong and sinned against God. He wrote, "I was formerly a blasphemer, a persecutor, and an insolent man" (1 Tim- 1:13)-He even called himself the "chief of sinners (v.15).

We too were once separated from the Lord because of our sin and were considered His enemies (Rom. 5:10; Col.1:21). But when we confessed our sin and need for His forgiveness. He cleansed us and made us

acknowledged our need for His forgiveness. He cleansed us and made us new.

Those of us who have known the Lord for many years may have the tendency to forget what we've been rescued from and forgiven of. Sharing about our past and current failures and giving praise to God for forgiveness will help us not to come across as "holier-than-thou" to people who don't yet know the Lord.
