Minister's Letter

I hope that you have all had a good Summer and enjoyed the spell of warm dry weather that we had in July. Now I have already noticed the days beginning to get shorter as we begin a new Methodist Year and look towards the Autumn.

As I write, Julie and I are busy packing the camping trailer, but by the time you read this we will have returned from our annual visit to the Greenbelt Festival in Cheltenham over the August bank holiday weekend. We have been going to Greenbelt for over 25 years now and this year is a special celebration of its 40th year, so we are really looking forward to it.

I often wonder what it is that has kept us returning to Greenbelt each year for so long. It is like nothing I have ever experienced anywhere else. The opportunity is there to listen to speakers on a range of subjects, listen to live music in various venues, watch theatre or films, visit art galleries, take part in discussions, just chill out or enjoy food and drink from the various caterers. There is so much on in the programme at any one time that it is impossible to see it all - you have to plan ahead or you can just end up floating aimlessly from venue to venue.

Over the years, we have attended in different guises. First as part of a youth group, then we graduated to taking and leading groups of young people, then when they had all grown and started attending in their own right, we began volunteering as Stewards or, one year, as a minibus driver. Now we just go to enjoy the show and recharge our spiritual batteries.

But I think one main reason I keep returning, is the experience of being there with 20,000 + people of all ages who share or at least have sympathy with a faith in Jesus Christ. Sharing Holy Communion in the open air on Sunday morning with that many people, really brings home the feeling of being in Communion. But not just with the thousands there on the site, but with all those who have been there before and all those the world over, past and present all sharing the same body and blood of Jesus Christ.

It is a great encouragement in these times of dwindling numbers in our churches and a seemingly constant stream of anti-religious views being published, to be reminded that Jesus still has the power to change the lives of all kinds of people from all walks of life. Greenbelt is for me a glimpse of heaven on earth.

I hope you get chance to see a bit of it someday.

Prayer letter 3 from Daniel and Grace Pratt-Chapman and their little son Kwame-

Our Circuit Link in Cameroon, teaching in a theological college.

I had a dream the other day. I was walking through a wilderness. Then, far in the distance, I saw a light. Up ahead a man was stood between two golden arches with outstretched arms welcoming me in. At first I thought it was St Peter, but then I realized that it was Ronald McDonald. I was running into a shopping mall. Though its deeply unfortunate that I awoke before I could eat a big Mac I am conscious that, unconsciously, I have missed a great many of the things about home I thought I wouldn't miss at all. This became very clear when I actually did get to eat some fast food in South Africa. Praise the Living God for His provision! Our college in Cameroon is linked with the

University of Pretoria. As a result of this I went to visit McDonalds ... I mean the theology department in order to present them with a copy of our seminary journal. I've been armed with 10 copies so if you know of a McDonalds with a seminary near by just let me know.

The climate in Pretoria was surprisingly cool. Nevertheless, though its far less humid, the atmosphere seems to be incredibly tense. It took ages to find an entrance to the university. Every gate was locked except the main entrance and that was surrounded with security personnel. The only comparison I have is that it felt like when I was entering a high security prison (for chaplaincy) in Bristol. It also took a while for me to find a McDonalds. In hindsight it probably wasn't a good idea to go out looking for a happy meal late at night. But you see I had that dream the other day and was convinced that the Lord wanted to communicate something special to me through his appointed representative here on earth. I was overjoyed when I first saw the sign. It was as though my dreams were literally coming true. At the order counter I was trembling with anticipation. I ordered two big Mac meals and we went to sit down in a quiet corner of the restaurant. As I sank my teeth into the burger there was a sudden bang on the window. A man holding a metal pipe was peering through the glass - communicating something to the people inside. In truth I actually didn't hear or see anything. It was only after I had finished that I noticed my friend had gone out to talk to the man -he's much braver than I am. There were security guards everywhere, electric fences on almost every building, and I couldn't help looking over my shoulder as I walked through town. In South Africa there are enormous disparities between rich and poor and the tension pervading the atmosphere is palpable. Though Cameroon is difficult weather wise, and though I'm not particularly fond of the snakes (or the police) there, the people are so peaceful and hospitable. If you visit a place, even a small village, they kill their best animals, serve their best drinks, and make you feel so incredibly welcome- even though they don't have McDonalds. Here it seems to be quite different. I even had to pay to enter a library. I don't remember having had to do that before. Not even in The Hague (not the prison but the library).

Parts of South Africa reminded me of Europe. There are high rise buildings, shopping malls, coal power stations and (praise God) fast food restaurants. I found myself uncontrollably desperate to buy all sorts of things I don't need at all. The funny thing is that I'm not conscious of ever running into any shops or enjoying shopping all that much - in the UK. In fact I always used to complain about how consumerism in the west oppresses the poor. While I

think I still hold these views it's only recently that I've come to understand their implications. As I reflect I can't help feeling that without the big Mac meal the world would be a poorer place - culturally if not economically. Nevertheless, even I find it a little frightening to discover that I am as desperate to go to Burger King as a man wandering in the desert for water. How easy it is to think you resolutely oppose something - mass consumer culture - and yet discover that unconsciously you completely support it. Yet when I think about it (if I'm honest) when we lived in UK most of the time we would go shopping when we had free time, when we were on holiday, or even when we were feeling a bit down. It's as though shopping became a weird kind of therapy. Though I could try and pretend that these excursions were solely for the purpose of eating gourmet food I suspect that (despite preaching many sermons to the contrary) I enjoy the consumer life style far more than I realize. Little clues are that whenever I saw a big shop in Pretoria I began to get unduly excited. It seems I crave the very thing I thought I hated. Do pray for us (at least pray for Grace who has to put up with this behaviour) that "we shall not want." That whatever and wherever we are our satisfaction and our peace will be, not in what we can eat, buy or own but in Jesus Christ our Lord and our Shepherd (PS 23).

LOOKING DOWN

READ:

Luke 18:9-14 I say ... to everyone who is among you, not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think, but to think soberly.

--Romans 12:3

After I had minor eye surgery, the nurse told me, "Don't look down for the next 2 weeks. No cooking or cleaning." The last part of those instructions was a little easier to take than the first part! The incisions needed to heal, and she didn't want me to put any unnecessary pressure on them by looking down.

C. S. Lewis wrote about another kind of looking down that we may have a problem with: In God you come up against something which is , in every respect immeasurably superior to yourself.... As long as you are proud you cannot know God. A proud man is always looking down on things and

people: and, of course, as long as you are looking down, you cannot see something that is above you (Mere Christianity).

Jesus told a parable about a Pharisee who felt superior to others. In a prideful prayer, he thanked God that he was not like other men (Luke 18:11). He looked down on extortioners, the unjust, adulterers and the tax collector who was also praying in the temple. By contrast the tax collector knew he was a sinner before God and asked for His mercy (v.13).

Pride can be an issue for all of us. May we not look down on others but instead see the God who is far above us all.

'PROMISES, PROMISES"

".WHEN YOU HAVE DONE THE WILL OF GOD. YOU WILL RECEIVE WHAT HE HAS PROM1S Hebrews 10:36 NIV

. MANY OF us remember singing in church, 'Every promise in the Book is mine!' Exciting words--but are they entirely true? If you've prayed for the fulfilment of a Bible promise that didn't materialise, you may have wondered, felt disillusioned, or even stopped trusting. What's true is that every promise in the Book intended for you, is yours! God is committed to keeping every promise He has made (Matthew 24:35).

So how can you know which Bible promises are yours? Here are some scriptural guidelines to help you: 1) Be sure you understand the promise. your interpretation of it When Jesus three days I will raise it up' (John 2:19 NKJV). His audience misunderstood thinking Him, meant the literal temple when He

meant His body. 2) Walk in the Spirit, not the flesh. Walking in the Spirit, Peter received divine understanding of Christ's deity. When Jesus asked, "Who do you say I am?' Peter answered, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God.' Jesus replied, "...this was not revealed to you by flesh and blood, but by my Father...' (Matthew 16:15-17 NIV). afterwards, walking in the flesh, the man totally misunderstood Jesus and was severely rebuked by Jesus (Matthew 16:21-23). Why? Because 'the natural man does not receive the things of the Spirit of God God is committed to His Word, not to nor can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned' said'...Destroy this temple, and in Corinthians 2:14 NKJV). So submit your thoughts to God; pray for His completely guidance, and in due course, you'll He get the insight you need.
