As many of the contributors to the magazine this month have mentioned, this is the start of the Methodist Year. 2022/23 has started

- New Supernumeraries are joining the Circuit (and we hope to have the opportunity to formally welcome them sometime soon) and we have said goodbye to Rev Shelia MacInaley as she has moved to Leominster.
- In response to the new Methodist rules, Brent Knoll and East Brent have joined together to form Brent Methodist Church, and Burnham and West Huntspill have done the same to form Burnham, Highbridge and Huntspills Methodist Church. The buildings are all remaining open.

- The Waffle Hub Community Café is opening on the 1st September in Burnham Methodist Church, we hope that this will be another part of our outreach into the community. Hopefully, it will link well with the Foodbank and the possibility of establishing other links with people and organisations.
- In the Circuit we are working hard to find a replacement for Gary and Angie but losing two ministers will be difficult in Weston-Super-Mare, and it will impact us too.
- The Methodist Way of Life continues to be the driving document for the Methodist Church's vision for the future and I encourage you, at the start of this new year, to dust off your copy again and pray about what God is calling you to do. The diagram on the front cover of this month's Link Plus give the 12 things that come under the headings of Worship, Leaning & Caring, Service, & Evangelism.

Please remember all these things in your prayers.

One thing for certain is that this year will be another year of change for us, and the things we will do this new year will mean that the start of 2023/24 will look different to us in ways that we cannot imagine now. Some things we will like, other things we will struggle with. Some things will resonate with our ideas about what church should be, others might challenge our notion of what church is, and what Christians ought to be doing. Nevertheless, as a band of different people, we are drawn forward together, bound together in Christ.

I end with some words of encouragement. These have been arranged into a hymn by Andrew Pratt (Singing the Faith 610) and are based on John Wesley's final words. The whole hymn is worthy of printing, but I have picked out verse 3 for us this month.



My call to preach

My call to preach. I first felt a call to preach when I was a student nurse back in the 60s. If I'm honest, it was probably more to do with congregations being so pleased to see a teenager in the pulpit than a genuine call. Many of the members could remember my great grandfather preaching in the circuit and were so encouraging. It was heady stuff. But it wasn't the right time. I struggled with preaching appointments, nursing studies, off duty and unhelpful ward sisters. Having had a long and very helpful talk with our Superintendent Minister, I decided to stop and wait and see.

Waiting and seeing took a long time. Marriage, two children, teaching in Sunday school, becoming a church steward took me into the middle 80s. When it came the call came dramatically. Tim and I ran the Youth fellowship Group meeting every Sunday evening. After Chapel, we had a lively group of questioning teenagers and they kept us all on our toes. One Sunday evening we were meeting in a large lounge and the chat was noisy and the discussions deep. I remember not being part of the group, busy at the other end of the room, not really taking any notice of what was going on when I heard loud and clear: "We'll have her preaching on the next plan!" What? Where did that come from, me? No way, I'd been there, tried that and it wasn't for me, or so I thought.

That night I couldn't sleep. The words kept going through my mind. Eventually I got up, found an A4 sheet of paper, drew a line down the middle, and on one side wrote reasons why. And on the other side reasons, why not. Reasons why took up one line. Reasons why not filled the page.

I spoke to our minister. Come with me on Sunday and do the readings and you will know whether it's right or not. I found that quite hard to believe, but he was right. As I read the Old Testament and the New Testament lessons in that service, I knew that it was of God that the time was now right, and that he was now calling me to the office and work of a local preacher.

My training took two years, 4 written exams and two orals at the local preachers' meeting. I was received onto full plan in 1987 and at my recognition service I received a letter from a supernumerary minister in our circuit. You may think you finished it said. But you have only just begun. Keep on studying. Keep on reading. Keep on learning. It was wise advice that I have never forgotten. Sometimes it's a struggle. Often it's a joy, but I can honestly say that I have never regretted answering the call.
